## Weaning Calves on the Range.

It seems to us that cattle growers might increase their herd very materially by arranging to wear the calves in the fail. The usual custom is to mark, brand and turn them from the herd. Some cows will wean their caives while others will not. Heifers are most apt not to wean their first calves. They seem to become attached to them and allow them to suck as long as they choose. Often we have seen yearlings on the range with their mothers, taking the milk of a younger calf. In early spring before the green grass comes, new-born calves who have to divide with yearlings ge erally get a small allowance, and are therefore stunted in their growth. Cattle owners should secure lands and inclose pastures in vhich to wean calves.
