## MINING NOTES.

A rumor has been circulating that the War Eafle deal is off. It was based on the story that the purchasers' agents had sent for P. The somewhat startling condition of affairs revealed by a survey of tite Mascot and Eldorano by which the Eldorado, incorporated in the Big Three, was reduced to a very small cipher, has been remedied. The encroachment of the Mascot upon the Fildorados has been deeded over bi Rufus Pope to the Big Three company so that none of the greand they thought the: had, when incorporated, has heen lost to them.
The owners of the frecburn are said to be about to attemp: a very diricult matter, the restoration of the money they paid for the claim on the ground of misrepresentation and fraud. Captain Irving wants te demonstrate the difference there is between catching a sucker and catchang a Tarter.
One of the earliest setters in Trail Creek was General Chas. S. Warren, of Butte. His statement as he looked down on the townsite of Ross!and from the War Eagle dump, in March 1895, was: "There is the mine I want a slice of." It was published in the first number of the Rossland Miner and was a remarkable instance of penetrative foresight. At that time Rossland was a hungry looking patch of snow disfigured by a few log buildings. General Warren has, this summer, been a heavy backer of Lookout Mountain. He secured the Sovereign which has now a splendid showing. In partnership with LicutenantGovernor Charles Mackintosh, of Kegina, N. W•T. he bought some time ago. the Sultana, another of the plums in that section of the country. They have been offered Sio,000 for the proyerty, by the represen tative of a London syndicate, and refused it. Negociations are very nearly completed for the incorporation of the property under the aame of the Sultana Gold Mining Company. Lieutenant-Governor Macintosh will be president of the company, and the necessary capital to make a producing mine out of a promising prospect will be recruited in the Northwest Territories.
Machinery has been ordered for the Homestake and is expected to arrive very shortly. After an adventurous career not wholly free from disagreeable incidents, this mine seems likely to sail on the smooth waters of prosperity.
Development work on the Monita will be under the superintendance of John Moynahan. ex-superintendent of the I.e Roi.
Mr. Campbell, hailing from Boston, a town where the treatunent of metalic. substances by electricity is further advanced than at any other point, is organizing a local company to finance a preliminary test of his process. The necessity for a local company is incomprehensible.
The Eclipse and Picnic are reported sold to a Victoria syndicatc. Consideration fictitious.
A neat map of the most promising propertics on Jookout Mountain has been prepared by H. Stevenson, of W. H. Taylor \& Co. It shows the Sovereign, Prince of Wales group, Sultana and surrounding propertics. The Prince of Wales group adjoins the Sovereign and consists of the Prince of Wales, Debs and Emma claims. The Sovercign lode has been opened in several places on the property. 1B. F. Slizubut has bought the property for a London syndicatc.
Dr. Beaupec, of Montical, president and one of the chinf promoters of the Kootenay Salmon Gold Mining

Company, will return to Montreal in three weeks after arranging the business of the company here. He means to make his friends and binsself rich by turning his attention to Trail Creek stocks.
In starting the working tunnel for the St. Elmo on the ground of the St. Elmo Consolidated an inmense outcrop of decomposed ron, arsenic, copper and ledge matter was disclosed at a der 'i of 15 feet. ## A WLUNDEREID INDESTIEY.

Mining in the Rand is carried on under worse governmental conditions than mining in West Kootenay In the first place, by darect and indirect taxation, by far the greater portion of which is borne by the min mg community, the normal surplus of the govern ment is about $\$ 7.500,000$ upon a total revenue of les than $s=0,000,000$. Then comes the dynamite monopoly, which imposes an unnecessary tax on the mlne owners of about $\$ 2,405,000$ a year, and the exorbitan. charges of the Netherlands Railways, amounting to about $\$ 4.750,000$ a year in excess of to per cent divi diend on the share capital of the company:
One thing the boer government does not do. It does not tax a man ss for the privilege of earning his daily bread by the hardest and 'most dangerous work. That refinement of injustice probably never occurred to those pastoral exiortioners. They might get a useful pointer on this matter from our government.

## TIEE CAIELBOO DEEIDEND.

Another dividend was declared by the Cariboo Mining and smelting company on the 17 th. Sixteenhousand dollars have been distributed among the shareholders. This the twelfth dividend paid by the company, the total amount being $\leqslant 200,410.23$. in less than two years, The bullion account is credited with ミミ21,266.19.
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There is a reminder of the stories told by some prospectors near home in the following extrac from the Dining Journal. "A despatch has been going the rounds of the daily papers announcing the discovery of tin ore in unlimited. guantities near the city of Guanajuato, in Mexico The discoverer announces that there is at leas $100,000,000$ tons of ore in sight, ranging from $2 ٪$ to 6 per cent. in tin. This is the usual amnouncement of tin fields, which makes its way into the news despatches on an average about once a yeat. In the present case the only difference is in the amount of ore visible, which is a little more than usual. Our contemporary, El Minero Mexicano, admires the modesty of the prospector, who might just as well talk of $1.000,000,000$ as $800,000,000$ tons while he was about it."
