

INTERCOLONIAL RAILWAY.

THE Commissioners appointed for the construction of the Intercolonial Railway give PUB-LIC NOTICE that they are prepared to receive TENDERS for the three remaining Sections of the Line, all in the Province of New Brunswick.

Section No. 21 will begin at the Easterly end of Section No. 20, one and three quarter miles East of the River Miramichi and will extend to Station No. 1610, three thousand feet Westerly from the River Kouchibouguacis, a distance of about zimiles.

Section No. 22 will extend from the Easterly end of Section No. 21 to Station No. 1180 at the crossing of the River Buctouche, "a distance of about 25 miles.

Section No. 2; will extend from the Thisterly end of Section No. 22 to the European and North American Railway, at Moneton Station, a distance of about 221 miles.

The Commissioners also give PUBLIC NOTICE that they are prepored to receive TENDERS for re-letting Section No. 10, the Contract for which las been annulled.

Section No. 10 is in the Province of New Brunswick, and extends from the centre of the Chapan Island Road, near the Court House at Newestle, towards Bathurst, a distance of 20 miles in leigth.

TENDERS for Section No. 10 will be made upon the basis of the quantities specified in the original Bill of Works for this Section; and in drawing the New Contract, there will be deducted from the amount of the accetped Tender, a percentage sum equivalent to the percentage of the whole work which the Chief Engineer shall report to lave been executed by the first Contractors.

These Contracts to be completely finished by the first day of July, 1872.

Plans and Profiles with Specifications and ferms of Contract will be exhibited at the Offices of the Commissioners in Ottawa, Toronto, Que-lee, Rimouski, Dalhousie, Newcastle, Hallfax, and St. John, on and after the 15th SEPTEMBER NEXT, and SEALED TENDERS addressed to the Commissioners of the Intercolonial, Rall-tar, and marked "Timbers" will be received ather Office in Ottawa, up to SIX o'clock I.M., on WEDNESDAY the 5th day of Octo-EER next.

DUBLIC ATTENTION

Is hereby directed to the following Sections of the Act of the Province of Ontario, respecting the Registration of Births, Deaths and Marringes:-

- 11. The occupier of the house and tenement in which a death shall take place, or, if the occu-pier be the person who shall have died, then some one of the persons residing in the house in which the death took place, or, if such death shall not have taken place within a house, then any person present at the death, or having any knowledge of the circumstances attending the same, or the coroner who may have attended any inquest held on such person, shall, before the interment of the body, or within ten days after, supply to the Division Registrar of the Division in which such death took place, according to his or her knowledge or belief, all the particulars required to be registered touching such death by the form provided by this Act.
- 22. If any householder, head of a family, clergyman, physician or other person or persons required by this Act to report births, marriages and deaths, refuses or wilfully neglects to do so within the time named, such person shall, for each and every offence, forfeit and pay a sum not less than one dollar, nor more than twenty dollars and costs, in the discretion of the presiding Justice before whom the case shall be heard; and it shall be the duty of the Division Registrar to prosecute all such persons so neglecting or refusing to make the required reports.
