Royal William and Mr. P. B. Casgrain's on the two Battles of the Plains. Since this last reference in our Bulletins to any of the Society's active contributions to public familiarity with such phases of Canadian History as are caclulated to awaken pride in past achievements and to renew the fire of Canadian patriotism, the Society has been instrumental in procuring the erection of historical tablets to commemorate the heroic defenders of Quebec, who repulsed the attacks of Montgomery and Arnold.

The suggestion of the Society for the formation of a Canadian Landmark Association has not only been acted upon, under the auspices of the Royal Society of Canada, but we have been honoured by the selection of one of our past presidents, Colonel William Wood, D.C.L., F.R.S.C., to the presidency of that Association.

We may also congratulate ourselves upon the additional honour which is reflected upon the Literary and Historical Society, by the selection of Colonel Wood, by the Mayor of Quebec, to be a member of the Quebec Landmark Commission, which has already devoted itself so energetically to the patriotic work of the preservation of the Heights and Plains of Abraham—the site of the heroic achievements both of September, 1759, and of April 1760.

The preservation of the Martello Tower overlooking St. Rochs is another happy result of the work and the influence of this Society.
