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would be allocated to FedNor initiatives for a total of \$69 million that has been allocated to northern Ontario.

That means that to date \$20 million has been spent, 260 businesses have been developed and 1,350 jobs have been created. For those in the opposition who feel FedNor is gone, this is the first time that any government has recognized northern Ontario with a special program and I applaud the government for doing so.
