Government Orders

Not only is this government not helping fishermen but it is adding to their burdens. For instance, section 61(2) of the bill states that fishermen shall be required to keep records of the number, sex, size, weight, species, product form or other information particulars on the product caught. Other information required includes the time and place of the landing, gear used and other types of equipment used. This is more information than the Cabinet ministers are required to give when they fly on their government jets.

The basic problem with this bill is not so much what it is, but it is what it is not. The government is using its blind-sighted attitude in dealing with problems in the fishery. As far as the government is concerned, extra fines with no enforcement guarantees will solve the problem. Once again, the government does not want to go to the heart of the problem because it is afraid of what it will find.

The Acting Speaker (Mr. Paproski): Oh yes, I did. I asked for questions or comments. I did not get questions or comments and then I asked for debate. As I asked for debate, the hon. member for Kamloops was coming down the aisle to speak. I recognized the hon. member for Kamloops, but I wish that you would not bring the Chair into this argument, please.
