Mr. Nicholson*—On Thursday next—Address—(No. 3)—For a copy of all letters and telegrams exchanged to date, during the year 1957, between persons residing in the MacKenzie federal constituency and the Minister of Agriculture regarding the appointment of persons under the Prairie Farm Assistance Act.

Mr. Hansell*—On Thursday next—Address—(No. 4)—For a copy of all correspondence, telegrams, and other documents exchanged between the government, the Dominion Coal Board or any other government branch, and any person, firm or corporation, over the past two years in respect to any possible increase in subventions for the movement of coal from the Crows Nest Pass area to any other part of Canada or foreign country.

Mr. Hansell*—On Thursday next—Address—(No. 5)—For a copy of all correspondence, telegrams, and other documents exchanged during the past year, between the government, the Dominion Coal Board or any other government branch, and any person, firm or corporation in respect to any possible sale and export of coal to Japan.

Mr. Dinsdale—On Thursday next—The following proposed Resolution:—That, in the opinion of this House, the government should consider the advisability of enacting measures that will seize every opportunity to encourage the decentralization of industry, particularly defence industry and Crown corporations, thereby

- (1) helping to reverse the trend towards concentration of population in large metropolitan areas with the accompanying social evils,
- (2) encouraging a more equitable distribution of population and development right across Canada,
 - (3) helping to stabilize declining agricultural rural areas, and
- (4) assuring the strategic dispersal of vital war industries in the interests of National defence and security.

Mr. Landry—On Thursday next—The following proposed Resolution:—That, in the opinion of this House, the government should give consideration to the advisability of introducing legislation, during the present session of Parliament, for the purpose of assisting seasonal workers in the lumber industry by decreasing the number of weeks during which they have to contribute from 15 to 10, and by substituting for the present seasonal benefit period, a period to extend from the 1st of December to the first Monday following the 15th of April in the following year.

Mr. Laflamme—On Thursday next—The following proposed Resolution:— That, in the opinion of this House, the government should give consideration to the advisability of introducing legislation, during the present session of Parliament for the purpose of assisting farmers as well as others working in lumber industry or in other industries, by further decentralizing the operations of the Unemployment Insurance Commission and by decreasing the number of weeks during which they have to contribute, to ten weeks.
