MIMICO DIVISION AS CIVIC CAR LINE

(Continued From Page 1.)

as low fares as are charged on the other civic car lines.

At present it is planned to bring the street car tracks over the bridge at Sunnyside and on to the junction of King and Queen streets, making a terminal there for the radial cars. The bridge will not be completed for a few months, but the opening of the summer season of heavy traffic likely will be early this year, and the radial cars probably will be running to the new terminal by the first of May.

Thus already there is necessity for preparing a decision upon the terms and conditions which will enter the city over civic tracks. It is well understood that a wheeler basis will be adopted. This means that the city and the radial company will agree upon the value of the traffic and the cost of the upkeep of the line, and then strike a mutually profitable amount of charge for wheeler. For every mile every car travels over the line the city would be paid a fixed amount.

Until the city is ready to clean up the franchises and develop a radial system, an arrangement will have to be made with the Mimico radial by which passengers within the city limits will have the same rates as on the other civic car lines.

Rapid Progress.

Rapid progress in the clean-up of the franchises is now possible. Mayor Hocken has a strong working majority in the board of control and the council. The agreements of purchase is drawn up and has yet to run the gauntlet of the provincial hydro-electric commission and the lieutenant-governor-in-council, together with their special counsel.

Presumably the agreement of purchase will be passed upon by the municipal authorities in a few weeks. It would then come to the city council in form that would positively assure a clean-up of the franchises. Only the matter of cost of the properties would provide discussion in the council.

But in this year's council is Ald. Frank Spence to support Mayor Hocken and Controller McCarthy in debate upon the value to the city of the clean-up of the franchises. When Ald. Frank Spence pays his respects to any alderman who voices the misrepresentation in the Telegram or the interested opinions of the enemies of public ownership, that alderman will be afflicted with the same paralysis of thought that has afflicted Home Smith and other harbor commissioners, since Frank Spence showed the inadvisability of giving any serious consideration to the plan plotted in the harbor commission for an alleged solution of Toronto's transportation problem.

Keep to Facts.

Mayor Hocken, Controller McCarthy and Ald. Frank Spence may be depended upon to pin their consciences down to facts and to parliamentary procedure. They will make mutiny and filibustering something very uncomfortable.

Up to the present time the opponents of the clean-up of the franchises have no other contention than that the revenues would not meet expenses and cost of extensions. They are gradually understanding that the three civic car lines could be connected with the main system at a cost of a few thousand dollars, and that would give a one-fare service over a large proportion of the city. They are gradually understanding that the double trackings of Yonge street to the northern limits would be a small cost, and would not only give North Toronto a single fare to any part of the city, but would bring in the radial cars from the only part of the contributory territory that is well developed.
