RIFLE RANGE AT CHARLOTTETOWN.

Hon. SYDNEY FISHER (for Minister of Militia and Defence) :

1 and 2. Land has been purchased from the following for the purposes of a rifle range at Charlottetown, P.E.I.: Alex. B. and Isabel Warburton, 26 acres—purchase price \$13,035, paid May 21, 1906. John F. Curtis, 14 8-10 acres—purchase price \$740, paid December 13, 1906. The Beazley Estate, 75 9-10 acres—purchase price \$4,527, paid December 13, 1906.

STATIONERY SUPPLIES FOR MILITIA AND MARINE DEPARTMENTS.

Mr. NORTHRUP—by Mr. Blain—asked :

What sum has been paid to, or is owing to, or charged by, (a) any person, firm or com-

pany, (b) the King's Printer, or any other department, for the books, stationery and other supplies ordered for the Department of Militia and Defence and Marine and Fisheries, respectively, in consequence of the investigations and recommendations of Mr. Falconer and his associations?

Hon. L. P. BRODEUR (Minister of Marine and Fisheries) :

(a) \$2,659.04 has been paid by the Department of Marine and Fisheries through the Government Printing Bureau to Messrs. Beauchemin Co., Ltd., of Montreal, for loose leaf book supplies ; and

(b) \$257.13 to the Government Stationery Office for books, stationery and other supplies, in consequence of the investigations and recommendations of Mr. Falconer and his associates.

The Department of Marine and Fisheries does not owe to, nor has been charged anything else by (a) any person, firm or company, (b) the King's Printer or any other department, in this matter.

Hon. SYDNEY FISHER (for Minister of Militia). As far as the Militia Department is concerned, nothing has been paid.

GRAND TRUNK PACIFIC—CONTRACTS.

Mr. FOSTER asked :

1. What contracts and for what mileage, and the price at which each have been let, upon the eastern and western sections of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway?
2. What is the date of each contract, and the period set for completion?
3. What is the estimated cost of the unlet portions?

Hon. G. P. GRAHAM (Minister of Railways and Canals). May I ask my hon. friend if he means the mountain or prairie section of the Grand Trunk Pacific proper or the Transcontinental Railway from Moncton ?

Mr. FOSTER. I mean the whole thing.

Mr. GRAHAM. I will get all the information. We define one as the Grand Trunk and the other as the Transcontinental Railway.

Mr. FOSTER. I will remember that in future.
