ties which she offers in profusion, of learning to read her stones, her leaves and blossoms, and of forming a nearer kinship with the wild offspring that swim in her waters or roam through her groves. He has touched lightly upon these boundless themes, and if his words shall bring pleasure to any who have trodden the path before him, or incite others to follow, his reward will be ample.
