

World Series Players Exempted Fifteen Days of Grace Allowed

MISS BERTHA DILLON SETS NEW RECORD

**In Free-for-All at Readville—
Beat St. Frisco and
Mabel Trask.**

Readville, Mass., Aug. 28.—Miss Bertha Dillon was driven by Serrill to a world's trotting record for four-year-old fillies of 2.02½ in the free-for-all trot at the grand circuit meeting at Readville track today. The Philadelphia filly, owned by A. B. Cox beat the fast trotters St. Frisco and Kabele Trak in each of their heats making the fast time in the second mile. The record was formerly 2.04½, held by Bertha McGuire and made at Toledo on July 24 last.

The largest crowd seen at the track since the American trotting Derby was held here in 1902, was on hand to honor

Geers' Day. The veteran started in all four races, but failed to land a winner. He had the satisfaction, however, of driving St. Frisco when that horse pushed Miss Bertha Dillon to the new record.

Nella Dillon, a sister of Miss Bertha Dillon, won the American horse breeder's futurity, the largest purse event on the card.

Chilcoat, a Canadian trotter and a favorite, won the 2:10 trot in straight heats, giving June Red, driven by Geers, his second win in three years. Chilcoat won three of three heats.

The granting of this permission removes the last obstacle to holding the world's series, which will start in Chicago on Sept. 4.
