Coal creosote, one ounce; water, 99 ounces. One pint of water weighs 16 ounces. One ounce of the mixture is the dose of a full-grown animal, and is best administered with the morning feed. If it is necessary to drench the animal, use a drenching tube, made by taking an ordinary tin funnel and a rubber tube. Place the rubber tube into the animal's mouth and allow it to bite on it, and pour the drench into the funnel. It is better to place a piece of metal on the end of the rubber tube, so that the animal may bite on it continually without stopping the flow by plinching the rubber tube.

Again, after the duttes of the secretary, his remuneration and so, forth, are set out in the agreement this interesting proviso is included as part of clause 17: "And the parties to this agreement do hereby severally promise, covenant and agree with the said secretary-treasurer to hold him absolutely indemnified and harmless in respect of any moneys parted with by him by way of settlement or division of any penalties of forfeitures that may be exacted under this agreement."

The phrase, "absolutely indemnified and harmless" has a strange look about it. Fancy the secretary of the Toronto Board of Trade, an organization formed for the purpose of promoting commerce, having in the terms of his engagement a sentence holding him 'absolutely indemnified and harmless' concerning any of the moneys which he may handle on behalf of the board of Trade.
