New York, Nov. 6.—According to in-complete returns from all over the state received up to 10.30 p.m., Chas. E. Hughes, the Republican candidate, has been elected governor of New York State over William R. Hearst, the nominee of the Democratic party and the Independence League, by approxi-mately a plurality of 50,000 or more. Two years ago Gov. Higgins was elect. ed on the Republican ticket by 80,560.
