

Keene's Undeclared Colic Wins Rich Futurity Handicap

Feature 2-Year-Old Race Decided in Ideal Conditions Saturday on Opening of Fall Meeting at Sheepshead Bay.

NEW YORK, Aug. 31.—Adding the richest purse of the year to his already long list of trophies, James R. Keene's unbeaten colic, Colic, won the Futurity Stakes at Sheepshead Bay today, and amply repaid the public, which was given a fine race, over the other seven horses in the race. It was the smallest field that ever went to the post in a Futurity in the twenty years history of the race, but this detracted very little from the performance of the winner. Altho knocked back at the starting line, Colic 6 furlongs, and badly shut off just before the elbow of the chute was reached, Colic led his field by two lengths at the finish and established a new record for the race of 1:11.5.

By his victory, he added \$7,500 to the enormous sum won by the colic in the Futurity of 1907, which was the smallest ever contested for an amounting in the gross to but a fraction more than \$35,000 against the big sum of \$77,000 in 1899.

A Drive for the Place. Bar None, a Nasuturium colt, belonging to Harry Payne Whitney, was second in a driving finish, with Chapultepec, from the stable of Fred Burlew, third. Bar None was second choice in the betting, and ran a fine race. He was under a drive all of the stretch, first in an effort to overhaul Chapultepec, the early pacemaker, and then in a vain endeavor to head off the fast flying Colic.

Excellent Start. The start of the Futurity, far up the cutting course, which was the first from the race, seemed excellent, as viewed from the grand stand, and the fleet field came rushing toward the finish, the colic and the other horses crowding together, and the crowd of cheering spectators could scarcely be distinguished. As the little group of thoroughbreds came closer, it was seen that Colic was well in the lead, and Miller was in the saddle, and was seen to be picking up the other horses one by one.
