

Two Favorites Win on Fourth Day

Kelpie and Stanley Fay Win Woodbine Features

Royal River Beat Merry England in Mile Race—Pioneer First in Steeplechase—Dufferin Plate To-Day's Feature.

Again only two favorites won at Woodbine Park on Wednesday. The day was fine and cool and the big card brought out a splendid attendance. Second and third choices, two of each, proved winners, and once more the last race furnished the surprise, when Wabash Queen, at 15 to 1, romped past Flat right at the wire. Seven-teen started in the first feature, the Michaelmas Handicap, that went to Stanley Fay all round. The Durham Cup, with \$1500 added money, was a gift to the Valley Farm, the only contest about it being Kelpie's sprint past Glimmer at the finish and taking the winning brackets from her stablemate. Both are by Martimas, who is evidently a sire of stayers. His honor the lieutenant-governor presented the beautiful gold cup to Mr. Hendrie.

Books Give Long Odds and Win.

The odds were liberal, the books must again have beaten the public, except the coterie of wise players or a few lucky speculators who always get away with some coin. In the 2-year-old race Clell Turney went to the post favorite at the odds of 10 to 1, likely proving a record in this respect for Woodbine Park. Red Walker was the winning owner, landing the second race with Stanley Fay and the sixth with Henry O. The jockey honors were evenly distributed. J. Lee has been to land a winner at the Woodbine. He had a leg up in six dirt races yesterday, finishing second once and third twice. He was up on Zinfandel in a favorite than the longer ones. In answer to correspondents, this is the same boy who cleaned the slate at St. Louis one day last spring.

Cloven Captures the First.

Good old Cloven, with top weight, won the six furlong sprint, the opening race of the day, after starting in the hard drive at the stretch. He was the short-price horse in the field of 12 starters, standing at 2 to 1, with the public going to him strongly. Cousin Kate was the only one of the others that was played to any extent, and she finished third, Donna Elvira landing in second place and another outsider, three lengths ahead of Cousin Kate.

Stanley Fay Repeats.

The second race of the day brought out a field of 12 2-year-olds, the largest number of youngsters that ever faced a starter in one race in this country. The race was the Michaelmas Handicap, for 2-year-olds, at six furlongs, and a high-class lot of youngsters, there were that faced Starter Dade.

Grande Dame, Sir Galahad, Clell Turney and Stanley Fay were at the short-figures and as good as 6-1 could be laid against them. The favorite, Stanley Fay, was the only one of the others that was played to any extent, and she finished third, Donna Elvira landing in second place and another outsider, three lengths ahead of Cousin Kate.

The crack rider, Charley Koerner, on Adrian, was crowded into the rail on the first turn, receiving a beautiful kick which put him entirely out of the running.

Royal River's Doncaster Plate.

Royal River, for 3-year-olds and up, at one mile, was the third, and brought out some right good performers. There were seven to go to the post, with Merry England the favorite, at 2 to 1. Pioneer and the Chief each went to four. Pickett, who had performed so creditably here at the spring meeting, opened at 12 to 1 and was backed to 5.

When Henry O. galloped home in the sixth race, the Quebec Purse, a selling race, at one mile and a sixteenth, for 4-year-olds and up, Red Walker captured his second race of the day, having won with Stanley Fay in the second race, and when Henry O. went from 3 to 1 back to 5, he sent enough into the ring to clean up a handsome amount.

First Mason and King of the Valley.

Both were the good things at post time, each being at two. First Mason and Zinfandel raced together until well into the stretch, when the latter knocked it. Henry O. always in a contending position, came fast thru the stretch and won handsily. Factotum, who had been the last turn and nose out the thing First Mason for second money. King of the Valley was of no account in the race, never being near the front.

Wabash Queen at Long Odds.

Jimmy Gallagher cut loose a good thing when his 3-year-old Pansolito, a bay gelding, won the last race of the day, a 3/4 mile event for 3-year-olds and up. She was as good as 20 to 1 in places and ran loose except for a few furlongs.
