NEWS FROM SOUTH AFRICA

Fifty Thousand Youngsters Gathered in Phoenix Park, Dublin.

HER MAJESTY IN SEMI-STATE

Each Wore a Little Union Jack and the Welcome Delighted the Great Monarch.

THE STATE PROCESSION TO-DAY

When the Route Will Be Thru All the Important Districts of Dublin.

Dublin, April 7.—The children's demonstration, which closed the Queen's week in Ireland, was probably one of the most gladsome days that either the Queen or Ireland has known for years.

Certain it is that the Queen is making fresh conquests daily, and her many acts of personal self-sacrifice have completely won the hearts of the people of Ireland.

Today's demonstration has elements of joy which the Queen has experienced but seldom in her recent gloomy months.

There were miles of cheering children unaccompanied, and the great procession, with a background of thousands of holiday-making elders, who accompanied them, charming weather.

The charming weather tended to make the celebration in every way delightful, and the Queen, who also to the little prices which followed the Royal procession.

The gentleness and spontaneity of the children's welcome to Her Majesty in continual good humor, and yet visibly affected her deeper feelings as well.

The fact that 50,000 children arrived at and departed from Dublin without any accident, so far as known, was not the least remarkable feature of the day.

State Procession To-Day

On Monday the Queen will pay another visit to Dublin, and the great promises to be quite the equal of her first entrance into the city.

The route will be thru one of the important districts not yet visited by Her Majesty, and was arranged at her own request, and the previously disappointed public.

Children in Phoenix Park

Children arrived in shoals through the streets, and the great promises to be quite the equal of her first entrance into the city.

The streets were full of picturesque processions of boys and girls, all the children carrying small Union Jacks, probably for the first time in their lives.

A Remarkable Demonstration

During the afternoon Her Majesty drove from the vice-regal lodge in Phoenix Park and reviewed the children. It is estimated that from 25,000 to 40,000 youngsters were present.

Presentations to Her Majesty

A little girl presented the Queen with a bouquet, to which a card was attached bearing the inscription:

"To our beloved Queen, from the children of Ireland, Queen's Day, April 7, 1900."

After the children's day, Her Majesty returned to the vice-regal lodge.

Children for Miles

The Queen's reception in Phoenix Park today was as remarkable in its way as a State entry. The lines of children extended for miles along the route, and the welcome they gave to Her Majesty's arrival they alternately cheered and sang in chorus "God Save the Queen," while huge baskets of duns and chocolate were distributed to the children.

The Queen Was Delighted

The Queen was delighted with the ovation she received, which culminated when a bouquet, composed of lilies of the valley and roses, in a basket of duns, was presented to her. By special permission the scene was cinematographed.

Drove in the Country

At about 4 o'clock the Queen and the Princesses, accompanied by a small escort of police, drove outside of Phoenix Park into the country near Dublin.

At eleven o'clock the children's demonstration began to be heard about the country.

These were the first arrivals from the country, being carried to Phoenix Park in military cars. They came from far and near. Some of them had travelled since 4 o'clock from Galway, Cork, Belfast, and other parts of the country.

With Bands and Banners

Nearly all the contingents brought banners inscribed with their place of origin, and individually nearly all carried smaller flags and a bag of victuals, outside which were written that it might serve as a souvenir, the dates of the birth of the Queen, her accession to the throne, her visits to Ireland, and the names of the contingents.
