A JUDGE WHO WON'T HEAR. Mr. Justice Robertson ought to resign. He ought to have resigned before it became necessary for the Premier and the members of the bar to publicly call attention to his incapacity, thru deafness, to discharge the duties pertaining to his office. The pertinacity with which the learned judge hangs on to office, after it has been pointed out to everyone for a long time that his deafness is gone, renders anything but credit to the bar generally. His Lordship owes it to his associates, no less than to himself, to retire when he is no longer able to intelligently perform the cases tried before him. It is a well-known fact that the judge makes no attempt to understand a cardinal feature of the pecuniary side of the question. The pecuniary side of the question should have no place in a case of this kind. If Mr. Justice Robertson has not enough sense to resign, the determination should be made for him by the public. He ought to have resigned a long time ago. We are sorry to be obliged to refer to this matter in the columns of the High Court, but when a judge is deaf it is necessary to speak a little louder than usual. Judge Robertson appears to be deaf in more ways than one. At times he can't hear at all. Other times he hears, but the judge's deafness, in a metaphorical sense, is even a greater failing than his inability to hear.

POLITICAL EXPERIMENTS IN AUSTRALIA. The people of Australia are not slow to adopt new political ideas. The formation of the Commonwealth has been the occasion for the introduction of two reforms of great importance. The whole island State of Tasmania has tried a novel political experiment, and does not appear to have suffered from her audacity, but rather the contrary. Her contingent to the Australian Federal Convention, in London, was the largest of any of the States. She has elected the whole batch of them by means of the Hare-Clark system of Proportional Representation. This system is on the same principle as that of the House of Representatives in Toronto, amongst them the Engineering School of the University of Toronto, now a faculty of the University of Toronto, which held its March elections on the 14th inst. The whole of Tasmania was one electorate. In round numbers 18,000 electors cast their ballots on the 14th inst. Each elector cast two ballots, one for the Senate, the other for the House of Representatives. The working of the system appears to have been satisfactory. The Launceston Examiner thus comments on the result of the experiment: "Each party had its successes and its disappointments, and this being the case, the system of voting by ballot is a fair one. It is a fair share of the principle, as far as the Government of real estate is concerned. The development of the principle will be watched with interest. It will undoubtedly grow into a large community, and the revenue from leased property ought to be more than sufficient to pay all the expenses of the municipal government. The system will now have the satisfaction of seeing their theory put to a practical test under unusually favorable conditions."

NOW HAS A USELESS ARM. James Wilson, a Soldier From the East End, Criticizes the British Army Doctors. There is one man in Toronto who thinks there is chance for improvement in the medical department of the British army in South Africa. This man is James Wilson of 98 Victor-avenue, who comes back with a withered arm, as a result of alleged improper treatment received at the hands of the medical authorities in South Africa.
