LIBERALS TO GET TOGETHER

Lord Rosebery, at Edinburgh, Welcomes the Suggestion of a Conference.

NO COMPROMISE WITH THE IRISH

See a Hopeful Sign in the Fact That Landlords and Tenants May Meet.

Edinburgh, Nov. 2.—Lord Rosebery, speaking at a crowded meeting here yesterday, welcomed the suggestion of a conference between the Liberal leaders. He said he was willing to promote to the utmost in his power the success of such a proposal.

He believed that the matter of policy the government might give the more money, and declared that he would be Premier he would have made Lord Kitchener Secretary of State for War. He criticized the administration of the War Office, and said Lord Kitchener ought to be kept at home to reform that department of the army and navy, and to carry out these ends.

The government's inefficiency, Lord Rosebery said, had been shown in the Education Bill, which was a piece of flagrant Toryism and would create a civil war in every parish.

Lord Rosebery further said it was the duty of the Liberal Party to do anything possible for the Irish, but he would not admit that it would be well if there could be developed from the basis of local home rule, Ireland and Wales which would relieve the country of business, relating to parliaments, domestic concerns.

Nothing for the Irish.

New York, Nov. 2.—The Tribune's London correspondent, commenting on Lord Rosebery's Edinburgh speech, says: Lord Rosebery's attitude in Edinburgh is uncompromising on the Irish question, and his Chesterfield speech is reinforced, with some evidence of Scotch satisfaction with his course and of personal loyalty to his leadership. It is obvious that the Liberal Party is not in the position of the party which stands in urgent need of more statesmanship and leadership.

IMPERIAL HOUSE OF COMMONS

Steady Course of Conservative Majority, Which Rises Above 130.

London, Nov. 2.—The Conservative majority in the House of Commons works like a well-oiled political machine. The reversal of Lord Hugh Cecil and the High Churchmen is the exception that proves the rule. Day after day and hour after hour the government supporters assemble in the House of Commons and follow the Prime Minister into the division lobby, and seldom falls below 130. While the Liberal majorities are never complete, the government benches are invariably full and discipline is not relaxed. This impregnable defence of a measure which is not in any sense popular and excites no enthusiasm is a tribute to Mr. Balfour's admirable leadership. It also indicates a dogged determination on the part of the government to carry out the course of two or three years, whatever the grumblings in the ranks may be.

Edinburgh, Nov. 2.—The efforts made by Sir Ernest Satow, the British Minister here, have resulted in the publication of the Chinese military official, who refused protection to the British missionaries Hume and Lewis, who were killed at Chen Chow, Ho Nan Province, August 15, by a mob, and the punishment of other officials implicated in the crime.

BOYS BOUND A PEDESTRIAN

John M. Grady Victim of Hold-Up by Four Desperados Under 16 Years of Age. WAS RESCUED BY A POLICEMAN

When His Pockets Were Being Rifled—One Caught, the Others Ran Too Fast. Four boys, the eldest of whom is about 16 years old, resorted to dirty novel methods Sunday night in an attempt to hold up and rob John M. Grady of 207 Lansdowne-avenue. Grady was going to his home down St. Clarens-avenue between 8 and 9 o'clock when he was attacked by the entrance to a lane. Grady's hands were pulled behind him and tied with a stout cord, and while he was thus helpless they assaulted him. Two of the youthful thieves were busy rifling the man's pockets when Policeman Cronin came to Grady's assistance. The lads ran away, and Alex. McCullough, 61 Montrose-street, was called after a hard chase. The others escaped. McCullough is charged with attempted highway robbery.

HALF A MILLION DOLLAR FIRE
St. Pierre, Miquelon, for the Fourth Time Burned Down. St. Pierre, Nfld., Nov. 2.—The town of St. Pierre, Miquelon, has been devastated by fire. SEARCH TIGER'S BED.
Italian Professor Hopes to Find Many Precious Relics. Rome, Nov. 2.—Prof. Ciro Nispidani has obtained leave from the authorities to search the bed of the River Tiger. He is confident that the mud over which the sluggish stream flows contains a libelous plot of extraordinary variety of curious things in the way of armor worn by many centuries ago and other valuable possessions into the Tiger as ferrets to the gods. Besides these, the professor also hopes to find many other things of value.

Rushing Coal to Canada By Lake Transportation
Toronto Dealers Fix Price at \$2 in Advance of Last Year's Rate. The Lehigh Valley road is handling much of this trade. The principal line for which coal is shipped northward is Buffalo and Ogdensburg. The longest single carry for anthracite is to Buffalo. From this point a reshipment is necessary. The various depots are making every effort to lay in winter supply before the waterways are frozen, because transportation rates are greatly increased when it becomes necessary to reship from Buffalo by railroad, instead of lake and river boats. Toronto coal dealers, spoken of Sunday night, admitted that the bulk of the new supply being rushed this way to the distributing points on the lakes. This coal, they say, is for points that cannot be reached by rail, but as a matter of fact Toronto is as accessible as any point in New York State. Receipts of coal at Ogdensburg for the last few days have been about 40 per cent of what they would be at this time if there had been no strike.

KAISER A MIGHTY HUNTER.
Berlin, Nov. 2.—The Kaiser has had a record of the Emperor William's hunting. During thirty years he has killed 41,443 pieces of game, including 3,880 deer, 6,508 hares or rabbits and 18,581 pheasants.
