20 YEARS FOR DR. KENT HIS WIFE GONE INSANE

Application for New Trial Denied—Wife and Friends Expected Acquittal.

Rochester, N.Y., May 18.—Leland Dorr Kent was this morning sentenced to Auburn Prison for twenty years by Judge Sutherland.

In sentencing Kent, Judge Sutherland said: "For myself I will say that I concur entirely in the conclusion which the jury arrived at as to the manner by which Miss Dingle met her death. Under the statute making the act of aiding another in the commission of a crime a capital offense, the fact of aiding another in the commission of a crime is sufficient to constitute the offense, and that she was the principal actor and that your part in it was subsidiary and incidental only. But I have no doubt that her wish to die, her consent to die, and her participation to some extent in the preliminary preparations for death would not have necessarily absolved you from the grave charge of murder because you wilfully and knowingly inflicted the mortal wound."

I will leave for others the duty of pointing out the moral lesson that is written all over this case. The few weeks prior to this tragedy, may have had for you some temporary allurements and pleasures; but that kind of enjoyment leads down to disgrace, dishonor and death.

Mr. Haines, counsel for Kent, will immediately ask for the discharge of Kent on the ground that he is insane. If successful, Kent will be confined to an asylum.

Wife Would Have Forgiveness. Buffalo, May 18.—Mrs. Leland Dorr Kent has gone insane as the result of the conviction of her husband. Her physicians describe her condition as acute dementia, and offer no hope for her recovery. While her life is not in danger, it is extremely probable that she will spend the balance of her days in an asylum. The Kents had been married for twenty years. When the jury brought in a verdict of guilty the shock is said to have affected Mrs. Kent before the Kent Dingle tragedy. She had planned to return to this city with her husband in the event of his release, here to begin again her life as it had been before Kent's arrest.

AT OSGOODE HALL. Thomas E. Hodgins, K. C., Master-in-Chief, left for San Francisco on Saturday night, to take evidence of the California claimants to the estates of the late Ed. Hyman. He was accompanied by A. E. Basto, and Messrs. Tennant and King, representing different persons concerned.

A motion against the order for security for costs, granted by the Master, was argued before Chief Justice Falconbridge yesterday, and judgment was reserved.

Judges' Chambers. An order was granted yesterday for winding up the affairs of the National Box Co., and J. P. Langley was appointed interim liquidator. The injunction restraining the liquidator, W. K. and H. E. Williams, from selling any of the assets on account of rent unpaid, was continued until Wednesday.

A winding-up order was also granted in the matter of the Baden Alchery Company of Berlin, and a reference will be had to the Local Master at Berlin, to settle the accounts.

Patrick Heffernan of Walkerton sued the municipality of that town to restrain its Council from paying \$125 to Mayor C. W. Crayman for services during 1902. The trouble arose at a Council meeting, when the Mayor ordered Heffernan, who was a Councilor, to be ejected from the meeting for disorderly conduct. Heffernan then sued Crayman for damages, but his action was dismissed, with costs, but the Mayor was unable to collect anything. The Council had paid \$500 in the estimates for law costs, and passed a bylaw, appropriating \$125 of this amount to repay the Mayor for a portion of his expenses. The bank carrying the town's funds then refused to cash a cheque for the amount, having been notified that an injunction would be applied for. The matter came before the Chancellor, and was, by consent, turned into a motion for final judgment. The action was dismissed, with costs, and now the Divisional Court upholds this decision. Mr. Justice Street, dissenting, however, in a lengthy judgment, from the position taken by Chief Justice Falconbridge and Mr. Justice Britton. J. E. Jones appeared for the plaintiff, and A. E. Basto, K. C. (Walkerton) for the town.

Local Judge D. B. MacTavish of Leamington, who took the Spring Assize Court there, handed out three judgments yesterday. The case of the Anderson Produce Company against Samuel Nesbitt was not a judgment for \$200 and \$140.82 costs, recovered at Winnipeg, Man., which the defendant

alleged was obtained by false evidence and fraud. The plaintiff was given judgment.

Alonso Matthews sued Darcy L. Walker and Alice J., his wife, for \$408.00 for building material supplied to erect a house in Rochester. His judgment against Mrs. Walker, as her co-defendant with her alone, but as concerning her husband, the case was dismissed.

John Burr, a Brighton, Ont., bricklayer, sued David C. Bullock of the same place for the redemption of certain land. Burr was hanged up in October, 1890, and wished to borrow \$500 from Bullock on a mortgage. The security was refused, but defendant asked for an absolute conveyance of the property, he, at the same time, offering \$500 for \$1000 to secure the return of the property on payment of the debt. Bullock occupied the property, but now must re-convey it to Burr, and also give an accounting for rents and profits, during his occupation.

Court of Appeal. The appeal of F. B. Carlisle from his conviction for perjury was argued yesterday, and judgment reserved.

The next case was an appeal from Robertson, J. Ed. P. Pilgrim and John H. and Albert J. Cummer were in partnership as manufacturers of mineral and aerated waters in Hamilton. Pilgrim sued the Cummers for a winding-up of the partnership, but the defendants said the firm was dissolved in December, 1901, on account of the dissolution being that Pilgrim should not carry on a similar business within 200 miles of Hamilton for five years, and that his wife should give security that he should carry out the agreement. The defendant also asked that \$500 should be deducted from the payment of \$2000, because the wife could not furnish the required security.

The trial judge ordered the plaintiff to carry out the agreement, so far as he individually could, but would not order any abatement from the purchase price. J. P. Mabee, K. C. (Stratford) and Thomson (Hamilton) are for the plaintiff, and Hamilton, K. C. and Ambrose (Hamilton) for the defendants.

Surrogate Court. On an appeal from the Court of Revision, Judge Winchester yesterday decided that all the property owners on Marlborough should be assessed for their new pavement and sidewalk. The Court of Revision had held that those whose property fronts on Macpherson-avenue were entitled to exemption. A. R. Haasard appeared for the appellants.

The Ontario Department of Education has addressed a circular letter to the educational institutions of the Dominion, offering to supply them with the surplus copies in the department of annual reports of the department, provincial school acts and regulations of the Dominion, as long as they last, upon application.
