CAN'T RECOVER FROM UNIONS.
Write for Recovery of Death Benefit

Set Aside.

The unsatisfactory position in which the law relating to labor unions placed litigants was again shown yesterday when the master in chambers set aside a writ served on David Campbell of Toronto and D. L. Shaw of London, Ontario, by the National Order of Railway Telegraphers. The action was brought by Mrs. John Wallace against the order, which had been given for the amount of a benefit certificate held in the order by deceased Mr. Cartwright. He held that the order was a voluntary association of men, and that it was not a partnership, no redress could be obtained except by suing individuals. The order was given by the court at St. Louis, Mo., and this may have the effect of rendering an action in Ontario untenable. The union is a friendly one and was not a member in bad standing at the time of his death.

Two bequests to religious bodies were declared valid by Mr. Justice Teetzel yesterday, who held that the mortmain act, which required such legacies to be made six months before death, had been repealed by recent legislation. The Baptist Church at Port Rowan will get about \$10,000 from the estate of the late Mrs. D. J. Barrett and \$2000 will go to the Westlake Hicksite Friends of West Bloomfield, Pa., from the estate of
