It was superb! beautiful! inspiring! exclaiming! that finish. There are no adjectives to describe it. It brought the grand stand to its feet and made the fans throw their hats in the air, and spoil their voices with frantic cheering.

It was the Chathams' game all the way until the last half of the ninth. The Londoners did manage to get a lead of one run in the fifth inning, but a wild throw to second by Lohman, in Chatham's sixth inning, tied the score. Then in the seventh, Nordyke hit to center field, and Crawford, after Lohman had misjudged an easy high foul, sent the ball into the remote, grass-grown corner, and Nordyke and Crawford came home, while Schwartz was hunting four-leaf clovers in the long grass. A muff of Sanders' high fly to Howells in the eighth inning, gave the Reds two more runs, increasing their lead to four. The Cockneys' eighth was a blank. The Reds' ninth closed with the bases full, but no runs scored.

At this point a number of the spectators went home, feeling certain that the game was too far gone for any material change to be made in the score. Hagerman had been strong and steady, and a hard puzzle for the Cockneys throughout. They couldn't get the ball beyond the infield. Then came the dazzling finish. Lohman began the music with a two-bagger to right field; Crow hit safely to left, Crawford dropped the ball, Mohler drove a grounder clear through Ziegler, and the bases were full. Howells hit by a pitched ball, forcing Lohman in; with McFadden at bat Crow tried to come home on a passed ball, but was caught at the plate. Nordyke's poor throw of McFadden's grounder again filled the bases; Babbitt drew a pass, and Mohler walked home, leaving the bases still full; Nordyke was very wroth, and began to say things to Umpire England. He kept on saying them until he was put out for the third time, coming in to third, and Cross going out to center field; Jones was at bat, and three balls and two strikes had been called on him. Charley took the next one and placed it beyond the track in left field. Those three men on bases came in and the game was won. The faithful fans went into ecstasies of delight, and the Chatham players still held their positions in the field, unable to believe that this thing could be. Even Pete Lohman had to pinch himself to make sure it wasn't only a happy dream. The score:

NEWMARKET RACES.

London, June 30.—The Princess of Wales stakes, run at Newmarket yesterday, were won by Flying Fox. Royal Emblem was second and Minus third, in a field of nine. Tod Sloan rode Birkenhead, but was unplaced.
A selling plate was won by the Duke of Portland's 3-year-old bay colt Latheronwheel. Mr. E. Brasse's Merrybuck was second. Sloan rode Mr. J. L. Lorrain's chestnut gelding Illogit, which finished third. This event is of 400 sovereigns, for 3-year-olds and upwards, the winner to be sold by auction for 200 sovereigns; entrance, 5 sovereigns. Eight horses ran.
The "Exeter" stakes were won by Mr. H. McCalmont's chestnut filly Juneeuse Doree, Terraphin, Lord William Beresford's bay colt, ridden by Sloan, was second. Mr. Arthur James' The Gordon third.

The July cup was won by Mr. Fairlie's 5-year-old bay horse Eager, by Enthusiasm—Greba. Sloan rode Lord Wm. Beresford's 6-year-old bay horse Knight of the Thistle, and finished second. Mr. Covington's 5-year-old Candelaria was third. The betting was 100 to 30 against Knight of the Thistle.

The Ladies' Stand handicap was won by Mr. J. B. Leigh's 4-year-old bay colt The Wyvern, by Ben d'Or, out of Playaway. Sloan rode Mr. C. F. Dwyer's 4-year-old chestnut colt Siv Fox, but was unplaced.

GREAT STORM ON THE LAKES

Cleveland Steamer Went Down and Nine Persons Drowned.

The Gale Blew 60 Miles an Hour—Fishermen's Narrow Escape.

Chicago, June 29.—The steamer Margaret Olwill, owned by L. P. Smith, of Cleveland, went down in the storm off Lorain, Lake Erie, last night, and nine persons were lost, including Capt. John Brown, his wife and son, and Miss Baldwin, a passenger. The Olwill, of 554 tons, was bound from Keeley's Islands to Cleveland, with limestone. Her cargo, listing in the heavy sea, sent her down by the stern.
Seaman Coyle was picked up by the steamer State of Ohio. John Smith, mate, Alex. McRae, and Engineer Schenkele were picked up by the steamer Sacramento and taken to Lorain.

COYLE'S STORY.

According to Coyle's story the steamer left Keeley's Island at 8 o'clock Wednesday night, bound for Cleveland, with a cargo of stone. There was little or no wind, and everything was favorable for a pleasant trip. At 8 o'clock the wind began to blow from the northwest, and the boat began to go at a lively clip. At 1 o'clock the gale commenced, and the wind blew at the rate of 50 miles an hour. Capt. Brown found that the boat was making little headway, and concluded that the only thing to do was to turn back and go with the storm. It was 2 o'clock when the captain gave the order to turn about. The vessel had turned half-way round, when the rudder chain parted, and in an instant the boat was

AT THE MERCY OF THE STORM.

She was caught between two waves, and as she was borne along the top of one of them she rolled over on her side. The cabins were torn loose and floated on the water, while the rest of the ship went to the bottom. Coyle caught hold of part of the after-cabin, climbed up, and held on. The wheelman was clinging to a part of the same cabin. Capt. Willoughby, of the steamer State of Ohio, sighted the wreckage about 5:15 in the morning directly in the course from Cleveland to Toledo. The large crowd immediately put into service her life-saving crew, and after sailing around for an hour and a half Coyle was rescued.
Heffron was thrown a line, but he was too weak to take hold of it, and died around in the presence of the crowd on board the steamer. Coyle was more dead than alive when taken in.

GALE BLEW SIXTY MILES AN HOUR.

Detroit, June 29.—The steamer City of Cleveland did not arrive in Detroit until after 8 o'clock this morning, on account of the fierce storm that prevailed on Lake Erie last night, which Capt. Archie MacLachlan says was the worst he ever experienced at this season of the year. "The gale blew 60 miles an hour," said he, "and the waves almost reached the pilot house. The steamer weathered the storm all right, but had a large crowd of passengers to look out for, so we turned tail to it and went around through the south channel below South Bass Island, to avoid the heavy seas that we would have encountered in the passage around the Dumny. This gave us the wind over our quarter, while by the other route we would have been in the trough of the sea. This roundabout course accounted for our being so late, but it was the safer one, and we took it."

BIG RAFT LOST.

At Menominee a raft of 600,000 feet of logs, owned by Donovan & O'Connor, was carried away.

The tug Nelson collided with the bridge and sustained 200 damage.

Old Lake Superior kicked up such a heavy sea that some of the timber and logs were blown overboard.

The tug Vigilant lost a raft off Port Hope.

At Toledo the schooner Webb collided with the steamer Elphick, doing \$500 damage.

AT HAMILTON.

Hamilton, June 30.—It is a good many years since summer residents at the Beach saw such a sea as that of Wednesday on old Lake Ontario. A hurricane blew all day from the north, and towards the middle of the afternoon it became very violent. The waves broke right across the piers and the spray splashed to the top of the lighthouse.

FISHERMEN'S NARROW ESCAPE.
Niagara, Ont., June 30.—Albert, John, William and Charlie Ball, Barry Patterson, Charles Bishop and Ted Bissell, all fishermen off the pier, had a very narrow escape from drowning yesterday afternoon. While out in the lake picking up their nets they were suddenly struck by a heavy easterly squall. Bishop, Bissell and Patterson were unable to make the shore, and were driven into Port Dalhousie, where, after a hard struggle, they managed to make a landing. Albert, John and William Ball succeeded in reaching here safely. The life-saving station of Port Niagara picked up Charlie Ball, a lad of 15 years, and took his skiff in tow. While off Chautauqua Point Ball's and the life-savers' boats collided. The former sunk, and the latter was stove in. The occupants all reached the shore safely.
