That was a remarkable game between the Athletics and Bostons on Saturday, and it will probably stand as a record for some time to come. Both pitchers, Coombs and Harris, are new-comers in fast company, and their work on that account is all the more wonderful. That they should succeed in deceiving the best batters on both teams for so long a stretch augurs well for the future. Coombs is one of Connie Mack's latest college finds, and this is his first season at the big game. The astute Connie has discovered many of the good ones, and it looks as if he has found a worthy successor to Plank, Waddell, and the rest. Harris finished last season with the Bostons, and has shown promise. Of course he has been handicapped by a poor team behind him, but he is game and will do. The work of Myron Grimshaw was a feature. He accepted 26 chances without a skip, many of them difficult. The number of assists of both teams was the same—33. Boston made two errors and Philadelphia one, only three misplays in 213 chances. It was a hummer, sure enough.

The games Saturday in the N. L. U. did not change the standing in the race at all. The Toronto finished up their season by defeating the Detroit Shamrocks, having won 7 and lost 5 contests, a good record. The only other game scheduled was between the Montreal and the Cornwall. The game.

All major league records—in fact, all records for professional ball—were broken by the twenty-four inning game played at Boston on Saturday. The previous American League record was twenty innings, and was set by the same teams, the Athletics, with Waddell pitching, beating Boston, with Young pitching, on July 4, 1905. The score of that game was 4 to 2. This is generally regarded as the major league record, but as a matter of fact it shares the honors with a game played by Cincinnati and Chicago, in the National League, in June, 1902, which went twenty innings to a 7 to 7 tie score.

No game played by teams in organized baseball ever went as long as that one of Saturday. There is a record of a semi-professional game that went longer, Fargo and Devil's Lake, South Dakota teams, battling for twenty-five innings in 1891, to a 0 to 0 score. Still earlier, in 1877, Harvard University and the Manchester, N. H., team, in an exhibition game, played twenty-four innings, neither side making a run. The classic game of big league ball of the early days was the famous eighteen-inning 1 to 0 game, between Detroit and Providence, in the latter city. Radbourne, the famous pitcher, that day playing right field for Providence, won the game by a home run drive.

Locally the American League record is fifteen innings, Boston beating Detroit in that length of time, 4 to 1, in 1902. Young and Mercer were the opposing pitchers. The longest local game of the present season was the 3 to 2 Detroit-Boston contest, played on the last visit of the Boston club, Donahue and Tannehill were the pitchers.—Detroit Free Press.

All sportsmen who find pleasure on the waters or in the woods of Canada, will be glad to note the vigor shown by the Ontario Fish and Game Protective Association. That association has just held its first annual convention, and it has adopted a series of resolutions looking toward a revision of the game laws intended to help in the preservation of fish and game from extermination. Every sportsman likes to find his hunting or fishing trips successful. It is recognized nowadays that nothing but judicious restrictions upon the men with rods and guns will maintain good sport. The Ontario association considers that fish and game are a valuable asset of Ontario, by their attraction to the tourist; and it proposes to perpetuate them, and to keep the game lands and waters the property of the public.

Among the resolutions adopted by the association was one forbidding the use of firearms in any lumbering, bark or railroad camp except during the open season for red deer. Another proposes to forbid the use of nets in the eastern parts of Georgian Bay, which are to be kept for the sole pleasure of the angler. The association put itself on record against the export of food fish, and it would increase by an inch the measure of certain kinds of game fish that may now be legally caught. These things illustrate the spirit that the association showed at the convention. The recommendations made by the committees were adopted by the association as a whole, and it will now be presented to the Provincial Legislature. They have yet to take the form of law, and there is certain to be discussion and probably modification, but with the general tendency which they express sportsmen will be in hearty accord.—Buffalo Express.

Both teams were desperate, and every man on the field tightened his belt and went the limit. Although 90 minutes of overtime was played, the match resulted in a draw, the referee calling the play on account of darkness after the third period of overtime.

Each team had scored six goals, and honors were even, when the match finished. While there was little roughness at any stage of the game, the play was always strenuous, and several men of both teams were placed hors de combat, principally by accident.
