Hard Soap.—7% pounds of sal. soda.
1% ounces of borax, % ounce of sulphite of soda, 8% pounds of good yellow bar soap. Dissolve the sal. soda, sulphite of soda and borax in 4% gallons of hot soft water till not a lump remains. Melt into the above solution the soap. Keep stirring, so as to mix well. When it is melted remove from fire and let stand an hour, then pour in palls or pans to harden.
