

WASHINGTON, Oct. 27 .- Mobilization of the full forces of the American Red Cross to combat the epidemic of WIDESPREAD STRIKE Spreading over the country was deter-Spanish influenza which rapidly is mined on today, and instructions sent to all points where the disease is making headway. In proportion with the public health service and the state board of health the Red Cross will enroll nurses and will freely use its accumulated hospital supplies to fight the

Reports teday to the public health service showed both that the disease is spreading and that the number of cases reported where it has heretofore been prevalent is increasing. This, however, was not the situation in army camps, the number of new cases reported during the 48 hours ending at noon today showing a slight decrease. Pneumonia in the camps continued to increase, with 4,532 cases and 1,388 deaths reported since Saturday.

Influenza cases reported from all camps since the disease became epidemic September 13, now total 167,000; pneumonia, 17,102, and deaths, 4,910.

AMSTERDAM, Oct. 7.—A dispatch received here from Sofia quotes the Bulgarian semi-official newspaper Preporets as giving the following as the terms of the armistice entered into between Bulgaria and the Entente Allies:

Departure of Huns.

Departure within a month of German and Austro-Hungarian troops, military agencies, diplomatic and consular representatives, and persons of those nationalities. The Turks were not mentioned in the armistice, according to the dispatch.
Bulgaria on Saturday notified the powers with which she has been allied that they must quit Bulgarian territory within a month, says a Sofia dispatch to the Berlin Tageblatt.




