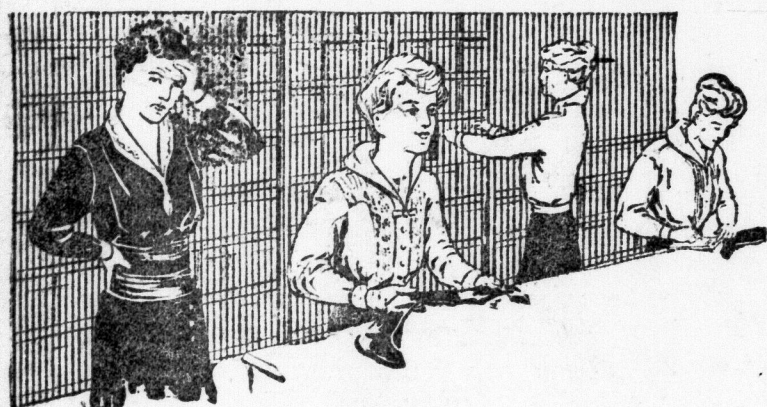

GENERAL POLICY FOR ALL S. A. C. BRANCHES

W. W. Shaver Appreciates the Work Done by Secretaries.

Approval of a general policy for all branches of the soldiers' aid commission by the head office at Ottawa was announced today by W. W. Shaver, inspector of branches. The system of paying for the upkeep of the branches on a 50 per cent basis with the municipality in which they are located will be continued.

Each branch is authorized to make short-term loans to soldiers requiring them, on adequate security, with ten months as the maximum time for repayment. They are instructed to arrange these so that they can be repaid in monthly installments. In special cases where larger loans are required, they will be advanced by the head office upon the local commission agreeing to be security for them.

It has been found that many soldiers have been sent to positions at outside centres which they later found were not suitable. The commission will now assist these men to find new positions by paying their railroad fare to another point. All money thus advanced by branch offices will be repaid by the head office.

All branches are instructed to co-operate in all forms of re-establishment work, and to prevent duplication as much as possible. A meeting of representatives of various bodies interested in this work will be called soon to discuss plans.

Further work to help children of soldiers is intimated. Two hostels, each accommodating 125 children, have recently been opened in Toronto, each caring for 125 children from all parts of the district. Hospitals may be established later if a need for them develops.

The head office of the commission will also pay the burial expenses of soldiers who die destitute in the province if the branch secretary decides that the case is one requiring such help.

All branch offices will be required to report regularly to head office, and they in turn will be kept in touch with commission business in all parts of the province.

FLOURISHING YEAR FOR TALBOT STREET BAPTIST CHURCH

Three Hundred Members Attend Annual Meeting.

Some 300 members and adherents of the Talbot Street Baptist Church met Tuesday evening to hear the reports of the various organizations of the church and to elect officers for the ensuing year. Before entering upon the business of the evening they sat down to well-laden tables provided by the ladies of the church, and a most enjoyable hour was spent in a social way.

The pastor, Rev. T. S. Roy, M.A., B.D., presided, and after a number of church hymns were sung most heartily the pastor called for the various reports, all of which gave evidence of healthy condition and aggressive action on the part of all the organizations. The total amount raised for all purposes was over \$15,000, of which nearly \$7,000 was for missions.

Among the most interesting and encouraging reports were the Ladies' Aid Society, Home and Foreign Mission Circles, Mission Band, and Cradle Roll, the secretaries for each reporting most gratifying results during the year.

The loyalty of the congregation was shown by a subscription taken up among those present to wipe out a deficit of \$350, which had been incurred during the part of the year when the church had no pastor. The clerk's report showed a church membership of 347.
