Barbados Wants Tourists. BRIDGETOWN, Barbados, April 17.—Barbados is going to do its best to attract tourists. Sir Gilbert Carter, K.C., M.C., governor of the island, presided at a public meeting in the council chamber of the house of assembly, and it was decided to ask the government for a guarantee of 3 per cent. on a loan of £20,000 (\$100,000) to be raised by public subscription. The money is to be spent in building a theatre and suitable bathing places and rest houses in various parts of the island.
