BallSeason Opens April 22, Toronto at Newark--- at Home May 6 with Baltimore

Note and Comment

This morning The World prints the much-talked-of and long-awalted Eastern League schedule, showing Toronto opening the season at Newark April 22, then jumping to Baltimore and back to Jersey City and Providence before returning to the island on May 6 for the opening game with Baltimore, Eastern League champions. Their stay at home is a long one too long in fact for the weather conditions, the Pets playing all the clubs except Montreal, and remaining at the island till May 29.

The Torontos have seventy-five games at home, with thirteen Saturdays. Newark are here for the first holiday, or May 24, then Buffalo comes on July 1, Providence on Aug. 2, or Civic Holiday, while Baltimere are here Sept. 4, or the Saturday previous to Labor Day.

For the American holidays, the Leafs are at Buffalo on May 31, or Decoration Day; at Rochester July 5, or Independence Day, and at Buffalo Sept. 6, or Labor

The schedule shows the Torontos, as well as the other western clubs, making four trips to the east, while the east only come west three times, but this is accounted to the fact that the western clubs both open and close in the east. For this odd trip the western clubs get 10 per cent, more in the division of the gates.

The Cornell University Daily Sun, in an editorial, takes up theh question of college cheering at baseball games, and submits it to the undergraduates for consaying:

I aminot an undergradute of Cornell University or a graduate, but I take the liberty of entering the discussion, as it is one in which I have been interested for some time.

Cheering at baseball games, except between annings or following a good play when there is momentary lull perhaps in the game is estinctly against, the ethics of good sportsmanship in my opinion. There is a vast difference between cheering to encourage one's own team and cheering to "rattle" an opposing pitcher and from my experience the cheering is usually the loudest and longest at a time when it is only too plain that it is directed against the opposing players.

There is a vast difference between cheering at a football game and at a baseball game, as the conditions are entirely different. In football eleven men are usually working together and so engrossed in the play that the sound of the cheering comes to them only faintly, if at all. In baseball there is far more individual work, and the pitcher in particular is quite likely to be distracted, even to the point of losing his nerve with five hundred or a trousand men yelling at him in the act of delivering the ball. There should be no need for the students of any institution to consider or discuss the question. The answer is plain. If Cornell will take the lead in abolishing all cheering when there is a chance for it being construed as a means to "rattle" the opposing players, then Cornell will have taken a forward step.
