## Lady Aberdeen Inspects Canadian Sanatorium

Lady Aberdeen, accompanied by her physician, Sir Wm. Thompson, His Honor the Lieutenant-Governor, Mrs. Gibson and Miss Gibson, Hon. W. A. Gage and Mrs. Gage, left government house by private car, placed at the disposal of the party by the Toronto Railway Co., yesterday afternoon at 4 o'clock, on a visit to the Toronto Free Hospital for Consumptives at Weston. About two hours were spent at these institutions by the party. Lady Aberdeen showing very keen and sympathetic interest in all the details and departments of management.

Entering the dining room at tea hour an opportunity was given Lady Aberdeen and the Lieutenant-Governor to address some words of cheer and encouragement to the patients.

This afternoon Lady Aberdeen will address the Women's Council on the subject of tuberculosis. On Saturday she will go to Muskoka, and whilst there will pay a visit to the Muskoka Cottage Sanatorium and Muskoka Free Hospital for Consumptives.

## Charities and Philanthropies

A meeting was held in Zion Congregational Church last night under the auspices of the National Association of Charities and Philanthropies of the United States. Mrs. H. J. Waterman of Cleveland, Ohio, presided, and told of the progress that had been made in the relief and prevention of poverty on the other side of the line. She also narrated some of her experiences in investigating the public health in the slum districts of Cleveland, and the "so-called fashionable" district, which she declared were just as dangerous, if not more so.

Mrs. E. Richards of Salt Lake City spoke of the work of the Women's Relief Society, which had 25,000 members and branches in all parts of the globe. They were the only society, so far as she knew, that had built granaries to store grain against times of emergency. They were now contemplating building an elevator.

## CATHOLICS AND Y.M.C.A.

Rodolphe Forget Gave \$1000 to Montreal Fund.

MONTREAL, June 23.—(Special.)—There is jubilation in the camp of the Y.M.C.A. campaigners to-day over their \$200,000 building fund achievement, but the building features part of the celebration was the announcement that Rodolphe Forget, M.P., a French-Canadian and a Roman Catholic, had given \$1000 to the fund. Small gifts are also received from different members of that faith.

It is stated that some time since Mr. J. O'Brien, of the O'Brien Mine, Cobalt, gave \$1000 to the Ottawa Y.M.C.A., and when his wisdom was questioned by the late Archbishop Duhamel, the millionaire contractor said the Y.M.C.A. was doing such a good work that no Christian could afford to ignore it. Here in Montreal there are five hundred Catholic members of the Y.M.C.A.

## RETURNING TO OLD PLAN FOR RECLAIMING MARSH

City Engineer Says Present Scheme Differs Little From One of Five Years Ago.

Other civic issues may come and go, but the problem of the reclamation of Ashbridge's marsh is ever present. The special civic committee which is dealing with the subject will meet to-day to consider a scheme which, as City Engineer Rust says, is a modification of one drawn up by himself four or five years ago. The plan is exclusive of roads and lanes. The scheme was gone over yesterday by Mr. Rust with Assessment Commissioner Forman and Joseph Thompson, commissioner of industries.

The idea is to start in on the reclaiming of about 170 acres on the west side of the marsh. This area is exclusive of roads and lanes. The scheme provides for ships for shipping, fronting on Toronto harbor; also for a pier 400 feet long, 40 feet wide at the southerly limit of the marsh, and the filling in of the present cut known as Keating's channel.

All things considered, the reclamation prospects are quite bright, in fact, they are quite as promising as at any time in the past 20 years.

**Battle Over Water Rates.** The local manufacturers do not intend to submit without a struggle to a raise in the water-rate from 50 to 75 cents per 100 gallons. A deputation from the Manufacturers' Association is to come before the board of control to-morrow, and present the argument that the increase will be a serious drawback to the city's business expansion.

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## OUR MANUFACTURERS SLOW?

Canadian Trade Commissioner to Mexico Says They Are.

OTTAWA, June 23.—A. W. Donly, Canadian commissioner in Mexico, hands out a warm criticism of Canadian manufacturers and their methods of doing business. In a report just received at the department of trade and commerce, according to Mr. Donly, our manufacturers are both "anemic" and "provincial," and fail utterly to appreciate the fertile field for trade development, which exists in Mexico. There is no excuse for this, he says, in view of the fact that Mexican imports are steadily growing and Canadian manufactured products are similar to those of the United States, a country which supplies 60 per cent. of everything imported by Mexico.

Phelps, the New York lawyer, who is regarded as a leader of the Indian House agitation against British rule in India, had been ordered to quit the Windsor Hotel, London, publishes an editorial article expressing the hope that Lord Morley, secretary of state for India, will take steps to prevent Mr. Phelps' projected tour of India.



## SUDBURY-800 ROAD

Hon. Frank Cochrane Returns From Tour of Inspection.

Hon. Frank Cochrane, acting minister of public works, and A. W. Campbell, deputy minister, returned yesterday morning from a tour of inspection of the roads in the Sudbury district and more particularly of the new trunk road between Sudbury and Sault Ste. Marie. They state that of the 80 miles of the road now under contract, some is already finished and the balance is progressing in a very satisfactory manner. The road when completed will be 180 miles in length and will connect settlements along its entire length, which at present are entirely isolated. The communication afforded by a wagon road.
