#### Popular Young West Toronto Officer is Killed in Action

In the casualty lists today, under the heading "Killed in Action," is the name of Ldeutenant William Hartley Willard, eldest son of Mr. and Mrs. Jas. C. Willard, 128 Evelyn avenue, who was officially reported killed on September 15. The late Lieutenant Williard was admitted to No. 14 General Hospital, Boulgane, July 24, suffering from shrapnel wounds in the face and eye. Prior to being fatally wounded he had only been in the trenches a month after recovering from his first wounds. He was 21 years of age, and left for Niagara immediately upon his graduation from Toronto University with the degree B.A. He was drafted to England from the 33rd Battalion last September, and entered the trenches for the first time on Dominion Day.

#### SLAYER OF CONSTABLE **GOES DOWN FOR LIFE**

Another Man Convicted of Man slaughter, Gets Twenty-Five Years.

MONTREAL, Sept. 22.-Alphons Foucault, convicted of mansaughter in connection with the killing of Constable Honore Bourdon in March, 1914. was today sentenced to St. Vincent de Paul Penitentiary for life. Alphonse Varin, for shooting and mortally wounding "Hig Jeff" McCarthy, a well-known local crook, was sentenced to the penitentiary for 25 years.

Joseph Cardin and Alphonse Charbonneau, youths, who killed Romeo Binette in a vacant house were sentenced to the penitentiary for eight and five years respectively.

Metallic nickel from cobalt ores is produced at the refining works of the Deloro Smelting and Reduction Company, Limited, formerly known as the Deloro Mining and Reduction Company. The output shows an increase over the 1915 production, which was not marketed during the six months' period.
