BUSINESS OF THE HOUSE

Prisoners of War

Mr. Cafik: I am not sure I have completely understood the hon. member. Am I correct in understanding that between now and six o'clock members will be prepared to pass this bill in all its stages? If so, I am prepared to call the bill now.

Some hon. Members: Hear, hear!

Mr. Knowles (Winnipeg North Centre): Provided there could be some voluntary division of the time available so that a few words might be said by spokesmen for each of the parties, we would be prepared to do it now.

Mr. Lambert (Bellechasse): Mr. Speaker, that proposal sounds very sensible to me. We sometimes waste time but, in this instance we want to save time. As for our party, we agree with proceeding the way the hon. member for Winnipeg North Centre (Mr. Knowles) suggested, provided of course the time is well divided.

Mr. Speaker: The House seems disposed to let the measure go through all stages between now and six o'clock provided there is some division of the time available to allow a representative of each party to make some contribution. If the bill is ready, perhaps it could be called as the next order of government business. Of course, the bill was introduced for first reading earlier this day so it would require unanimous consent at each stage before going further. In particular, it would require unanimous consent to change the motion so as to refer the bill to the committee of the whole House.

AMENDMENT TO EXTEND SCOPE OF BENEFITS

Hon. Daniel J. MacDonald (Minister of Veterans Affairs) moved that Bill C-27, to amend the Compensation for Former Prisoners of War Act, be read the second time.

He said: Mr. Speaker, I am very pleased to speak today on a bill designed to improve the lot of members of the armed forces who were prisoners of war during the first world war and others who were later evaders in enemy or enemy occupied territory. The House will agree that Canada owes a debt of gratitude to the men and women who answered the call of their country and served so gallantly for the preservation of our freedom.
