HURLS ONE SHOE AT MAGISTRATE

And the Other at Head of Clerk of Court When Suffragette Was Remanded For Further Inquiry.

ABERDEEN, Scotland, Nov. 30.—Militant suffragettes today brought about two scenes of extreme violence, in which a woman's shoes and a horse whip were used as weapons.

The first outrage occurred when three of the women, Joyce Locke, Fanny Parker and Mary Pollock, who had been caught last evening in possession of explosives in the music hall where Chancellor Lloyd George was to speak, were brought up before the magistrate.

After hearing the evidence, the magistrate remanded them for further inquiry. As he informed them of this, Joyce Locke removed her shoe and hurled it at the head of the magistrate's head, and then threw the other at the head of the clerk of the court. She was promptly committed for contempt of court.

The second outrage was committed by one of the members of a party of suffragettes who were waiting at the railroad station for the departure of Chancellor Lloyd George. The woman mistook the Forbes Mackenzie for the Chancellor of the Exchequer in disguise. She lashed the clerkman across the face with a heavy horse whip and was at once arrested.

ALL LINES OF BUSINESS ON ENCOURAGING BASIS

Bradstreet's Reports Show Toronto Enjoying Active Trade— Outlook Good This Winter.

Toronto reports to Bradstreet's say that almost every line of business is on an encouraging basis at present. Collections have been fair in some departments and business orders have been coming in freely and prices have been softening in many instances. Advances in building papers and other building materials. Building operations have not let up at all and contracts must be filled. Leather is in good demand and recently advanced prices hold. Shoe manufacturers are pressed with turned down in some cases. The lumber industry is on a very active footing. A good business is being done in house building materials and finished lumber for interior work. Orders are coming in briskly. Fruit and vegetables are not let up at all and prices are higher than a year ago. Canned goods are quiet. Fats and beans are so scarce and high that they are being profitably imported. Cattle have advanced 25 cents on last week in a strong market, while sheep went up the same, and lambs advanced 20 cents per cwt. Some wheat has sold for ocean shipment, but wheat, corn and oats have declined in value. Tight money is keeping bond and stock markets quiet, while securities are holding firm. Real estate market has been strong in downtown districts. Prospective factories have difficulties in securing land. Sales of vacant land are frequent.

MONTREAL, Nov. 30.—In an effort to clear up the point as to whether Sir John A. Macdonald insulted the Princess Louise, the Montreal Star published the following cable to the Duke of Argyll, the husband of the princess:

"Cartwright's memoir, just out, says Sir John A. Macdonald on unfriendly terms Princess Louise last two years, her stay, owing affront put on her by Macdonald."

"The duke cabled back: 'Rubbish.'"

"This reply," says the Star, "should give the story its quietus."

EASTERN TOWNSHIP INVESTORS STUNG

Promised Sixteen Per Cent. Interest and Money Flowed In to Establish a Sanitarium.

MONTREAL, Nov. 30.—Many residents in the eastern township are anxious to learn the whereabouts of Dr. A. Judson McNeil, who has not been heard from since he left the Village of Hemmingford for the past two weeks.

The sanitarium was fitted up and operated with the money of those who invested in the concern in anticipation of receiving interest at the rate of sixteen per cent. per annum. It is claimed that sixty thousand dollars had been received by the Doctor A. Judson McNeil Sanitarium from investors. As there are claims to be settled the institution will be in the hands of bailiffs today.


NO OVERLAPPING OF MONTREAL CHARITY


