A TEMPORARY SETBACK

The members of the city council knew long before they referred the question of the date of the re-licensing vote to the recorder what his opinion would be. It was freely whispered about city hall and elsewhere. There was no need, therefore, to go through the formality of a referendum.

NO RE-ORGANIZATION

The re-organization bureau at city hall has at last got around to Mr. Murdoch again and has made him engineer. A large amount of more or less valuable time has been spent in useless discussion, and some money spent in advertising for a city engineer.

REFORMER O'REGAN

There was a heart-to-heart talk the other night between the Bowers Mission and the unfortunate who are almost to a man, the latter berated the private charities which require the unemployed to work for his keep.

A Washington despatch says: "An increase of the navy to the extent of appropriations of \$29,000,000 was agreed upon today by the House Committee on Naval Affairs. The following programme for appropriations at this session was adopted by the committee: Two battleships of 26,000 tons displacement, \$10,000,000. Five torpedo boat destroyers, \$4,000,000. Three colliers, \$3,800,000. Four submarines, \$2,000,000. One sub-surface boat, \$400,000.

Hon. Mr. Morrissey's estimate that it will take \$200,000 to repair the damage done to provincial public works by the late fire and freshet, will serve to whet the appetites of contractors. It is a fair guess that no Liberals need apply, despite the fact that the government got into power through the aid given by Liberal voters. The position Mr. Morrissey is in is not the best country in the world in which to do what he might desire to do would not commend itself to his colleagues. They are looking after the interests of the Conservative party.

Railroad strikers in Brazil have gone a step farther than has been taken elsewhere. They have not only gone out, but have seized the railroad. If that is the sort of thing to be expected in Brazil, it is not the best country in the world in which to invest capital.

PROVINCIAL NEWS

New Brunswick

The allegation of their preferred against N. W. McIvor, agent on the North Shore of the Erie Company of St. John, was dismissed by Stipendiary Magistrate, of Newcastle. The complainant alleged that McIvor took two checks and a clothes wringer from her house, which she did not pay him for.

Nova Scotia

John Malone, arrested in a deserted house at Dutch Village, near Halifax, on Monday for vagrancy, said he spent some time in St. John on his tramp from Toronto. The house in which he was living was devoid of windows and unfit for habitation.

S. P. C. representatives who visited houses at Beech Hill, near Halifax, on Monday, saw in one instance the children of one home unclean, terrified, hungry and filthy garbed, and resembling little animals. They disappeared when the visitors approached, and remained in concealment until their departure. The pigs and other domestic animals were almost dead from starvation, and altogether, filthy conditions prevailed.

Michael Monaghan, of Port Morien, C. B., is in jail at Sydney, accused of theft. Monaghan is the husband of Mary Donahue, who was arrested at Sydney, last week, at Sydney, under suspended sentence for breaking and entering.

The Municipal Council has adopted a report dealing the Louisa, C. B., lock-up to the town. An auditor will hereafter be employed to audit the town accounts. The date of the civic elections for Louisa is February 2.

It is reported that a petition is in circulation at Sydney Mines, which will be placed before the provincial legislature at the coming session asking for legislation to divide the town into wards.

The S. S. Herm, which is discharging Spanish ore for the N. S. Steel Co., at North Sydney, will ship a new propeller before proceeding to sea. The Herm lost two fuses of her propeller while on the voyage out.

At Arichat, C. B., Judge Graham rendered judgment in favor of Neil D. McIntosh with costs against the Cape Breton Railway for incorrect delivery of a trunk which was checked from Boston to St. Peter's, C. B., and given to a man named McKillop at its destination. When the owner recovered it \$75 in money and \$11 in clothes had been extracted, whereupon he instigated a suit for damages to cover his loss. Representatives of several of the big railroads were onlookers at the case. In the verdict it was stated that if the cash and apparel had been stolen en route the company would not have been liable.

Up to date three candidates are in the field for the Halifax mayoralty chair, the trio being Aldermen J. A. Chisholm, Andrew Hubby and F. P. Bigh. Mayor Crosby's absence in Ottawa during the session will leave his duties to be performed by the deputy mayor.

The Parsons brothers, who were so seriously injured by being struck by the N. S. & C. Co.'s train last week, at Sydney Mines, continue to hold their own, and some hopes are now entertained for their recovery. The steamer Portia arrived at North Sydney on Monday from Newfoundland, and on investigation a case of smallpox was ascertained to be on board. A conference of the N. S. Steel Company's officials and the town health authorities was immediately held and it was arranged that the steamer should bunker coal and return to her starting point. It was feared that if the vessel was detained under quarantine, she might be marooned in the ice until spring. A policeman guarded the pier and saw that communication with the town was not entered into by the crew.

A new hockey league has been promoted with teams from Dartmouth, Lunenburg and Windsor, and possibly Wolfville. If the league is named the West Nova Scotia League, the pennant winners will be entitled to challenge for the Starr Trophy, otherwise it may figure as an intermediate league. One Windsor septette is in the N. S. League.

At the meeting of the Amherst town council on Monday night a motion was passed to call a public meeting on Friday to discuss the proposed establishment of the White Candy Co., in Amherst, and the terms whereby the industry is available.

After a time the aged farmer married Lucy Richmond and the two families continued to occupy the same home.

A few weeks after the marriage Mrs. Richmond became the wife of David Dillinger, the older son, Jennie Richmond and Charles Dillinger next were stricken with the matrimonial fever and were married last week.

The three families now live in the East Finley township home of the elder Dillinger, all apparently happy and contented.

SEVERE ACCIDENT AT ST. MICHEL DE BELLECHASSE YESTERDAY—FIFTEEN PEOPLE INJURED—CARS DERAILED AT PETIT ROCHER

Quebec, Jan. 12.—Fifteen people were injured, some more or less seriously, in a railway collision today on the Intercolonial Railway at St. Michel de Bellechasse, when a freight train derailed into the local market street from Rivere du Loup as it was standing in the station yard.

The accident occurred about 6 o'clock this morning, though it was several hours later before intelligence reached the city. The freight ran into the rear end of the market train, causing two or three cars to telescope and badly damaging them.

The most surprising thing about this disaster is that many people were not killed outright.

The injured received immediate attention from Dr. Marcotte, Dr. Michel, and later in the day were brought up to Levis by special train.

Fernand Joseph Boucher, of the freight train, is the worst injured, but may recover. The engineer escaped with slight injuries.

Another man named Boucher, of Rivere du Loup, has his head badly cut and bruises on the limbs, face or body.

Others, who sustained severe injuries, are Soucy and Albert Bergeron; Ernest Dufour, St. Roch des Aulnaies; Ernest St. Pierre of Montbagny; Leonor Corrivau, St. Valier; Jean Guay, Montbagny; E. Dione, E. Roussel and H. Charon, of St. Phillip de Neri; Emil Rossignol, Freresville, and Joseph Dugas, a mail conductor.

Monday, Jan. 12.—(Special)—Three cars on No. 39 freight which left Moncton last night were derailed at Petit Rocher early this morning and blocked the line for a few hours. The Campbell express was two hours late arriving here in consequence of the run off. Damage was slight and no person was injured.

Winnipeg, Jan. 12.—The charges of Haultain against Commissioner of Education Galt were debated with heat in the Saskatchewan legislature yesterday. The matter arises over the contract for public school books. The net result of the debate was the adoption of a resolution calling for the appointment of a royal commission, composed of judges of the provincial supreme court, to inquire fully into the whole subject of contract, and the various charges made by opposition in connection therewith.
