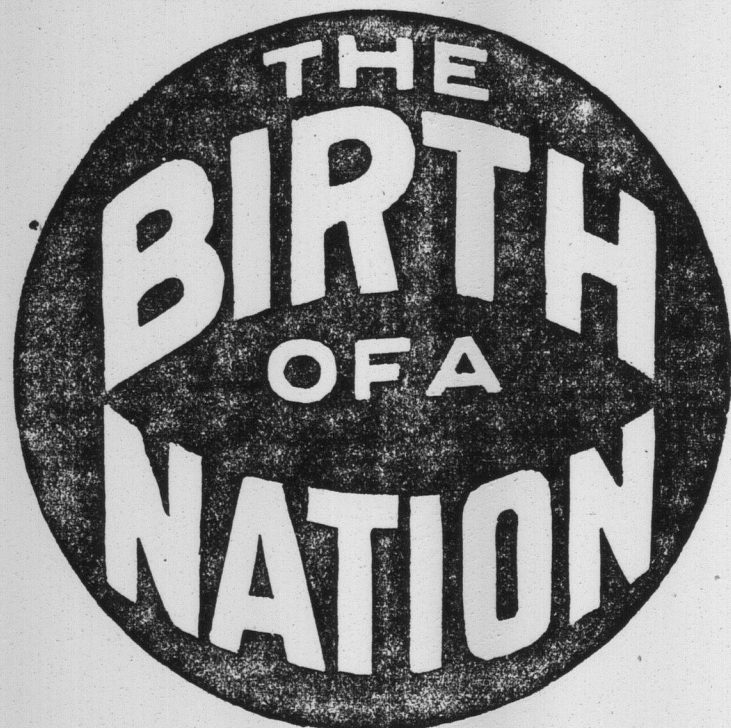

Wagner Celebrates Birthday
Pittsburg, Pa., Feb. 24—John Henry (Honus) Wagner on Saturday celebrated his 43rd birthday. Though far past the age when most baseball players retire, Wagner was on Saturday playing his 17th year in the major league. He holds records of having played in more games, scored more runs, made more hits and stolen more bases than any other ball player who has ever lived. Baseball fans of Pittsburg on Saturday night celebrated Wagner's birthday with a banquet in his honor. Among the speakers at the banquet were John K. Tener, president of the National League; John J. Evers of the Boston Nationals; Napoleon Lajoie, manager of the Toronto International; Edward G. Barrow, president of the International League; Fred Clark, former manager of the Pittsburg Nationals; Barney Dreyfus, president of the Pittsburg National club; and August Herrman, chairman of the National Baseball Commission.

Referee Saves Zulu Kid
A large holiday crowd at the Pioneer Sporting Club, New York, on Washington's birthday, saw Frankie Burns, a veteran Jersey City bantamweight boxer, administer a decisive defeat to Young Zulu Kid, a Brooklyn boxer, who recently was knocked out by Jimmy Wilde, England's flyweight champion. Burns, so far outclassed Zulu Kid that Referee Patsy Haley found it necessary to stop the contest in the fourth round to save the Brooklyn boy from further punishment.
