BULGARS KILL 80 CIVILIANS IN MONASTIR CITY

Corfu, Greece, March 20.—Asphyxiating gas bombs thrown into the open city of Monastir by the Bulgarians in their violent bombardment of March 17 killed more than sixty civilians, including twenty-five women and thirty-one children, according to the Serbian press bureau. Nearly twenty others, mostly women and children, were killed by shell fire.
