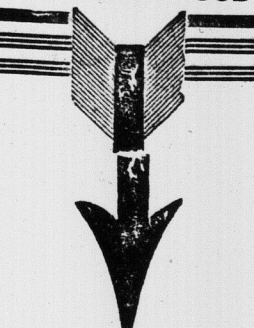

PRICES MOVE HIGHER IN WALL ST. TODAY

Several Stocks Make Gains of Point or More After Break

MONTREAL, Feb. 27.—Heavy trading in National Breweries and a break in the price of that issue featured the opening of the Montreal Stock exchange this morning. Breweries opened down 1 1/2 at 63, and by the end of the first half hour had eased to 61 1/2. With the exception of Brazilian Traction and Montreal Power, the balance of the market was quiet and easier. The former was steady at 85, while the latter was off a point at 220.

IN WALL STREET.
NEW YORK, Feb. 27.—Strong buying support was in evidence at the opening of today's stock market and prices moved irregularly higher. The sharp break yesterday apparently had resulted in a number of margin calls, with the result that General Electric broke 3 points and several others yielded large fractions. Initial gains of a point or more, were recorded by Hudson Motors, Studebaker, New York Central and Radio Corporation. U. S. Steel common opened at 125, up 1 1/2.

Current Events

NEW YORK, Feb. 27.—Swift & Co. declared regular quarterly dividend of 2¢ on common. "Pulse" reports 418 commercial failures for week ending, against 478 in preceding week, and 400 in five days last year. Reports moderate slacking in business activity of seasonal character, but such buying keeps manufacturers well supplied. Bradstreet finds some irregularity with wholesale trade holding up well. "Twenty" industrial 124.68, off 1.80; 20 rails 107.68, off 1.55.

NEW YORK, Feb. 27.—Hutton: "Amongst stocks we like are Consolidated Gas, U. S. Steel, and the Canadian Pacific. Union Oil of California, White Star, South American, and the C. P. R. are also good. Tobey and Kline: "There is no doubt that many stocks have advanced beyond reason and the result will be many of them to lower levels than seemed possible a while ago. SAINT JOHN RETAIL TRADE KEEPS FAIR

WINNIPEG, Feb. 26.—The weekly trade report of the Canadian Retail Merchants' Association Limited reads: "Halifax—Trade generally has been in the north with some extent by heavy storms which tied up the railroads. Heavy operations being particularly affected. Saint John—Wholesale trade reported quiet and retail trade fair. Collections not good for this time of the year."

TRAINS LATE, AND WHY

For the first time this winter during the chain of storms, the Montreal express is behind time today, being reported an hour late. This is said to be caused by a derailed freight train west of Megantic. The Boston express was reported two and a half hours late, but no reason was given. It is expected the storm beginning in Saint John after the lunch hour was severe along the Atlantic coast in the trail of the Boston train. The Maritime express from the east was on time today.

Mr. Boys announced the Conservative intention of keeping up the debate until Premier King takes his seat in the House.

Meeting Supports Him For Commissioner—Was Asked to Be County Candidate

A meeting held last evening in Moose Hall in the interest of Commissioner Wigmore, head of the water and sewerage department, who is offering for re-election this spring, was well attended and enthusiastic in support of the commissioner. He reviewed his civic record as an alderman in the old council and as a commissioner. He outlined in detail the workings of the department and what had been accomplished for bettering the city distribution.

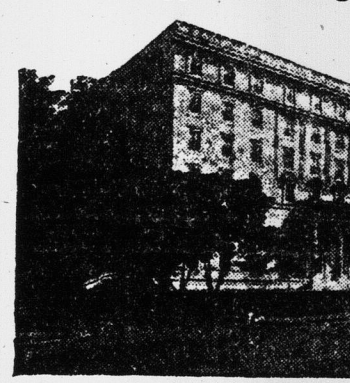
English Is Chosen Official Language
