

S.S. Lord Devonshire Is To Open Saint John Service

Cairn Line to Make Some Voyages Here-Reported One of **Emperors Sold** 

The first Head Line sailing of the winter port season will be the Lord Downshire, which is expected to arrive on Dec. 10 to load for Belfast and Dublin, it was announced this morning at the local office of McLean, Kennedy, Ltd., agents for the line. The last two steamers out of Montreal in this service will be the Dunaff Head on Nov. 22 for Dublin and Belfast. It is planned to have sailing every ten days during the winter, although the complete sailing list has not been forwarded as yet.


