New York, Aug. 15—Dave Rosenberg of Brooklyn, battled his way to a 10-round victory on points over Phil Krug of Harrison, N. J., and won the recognition of New York State Boxing Commission as champion middleweight of the world last night at the New York Velodrome.
Rosenberg, however, only enjoys the title in this state as no other regulatory body has upheld the empire state ruling that deprived Johnny Wilson of Boston of his title because he declined the purse proposed to him for a match with the Brooklyn boy. Officially, the winner's heavy title, does not intend to sit idle while awaiting a match against Jack Dempsey. Paddy Mullins, manager of the New Orleans heavyweights, has accepted two of the numerous offers he has received for Will's services, and is seriously considering several other attractive matches. Will will make his next ring appearance at the First Regiment Armory, Newark, N. J., on the night of Aug. 21, in a bout against Buddy Jackson, European and South American colored boxer, who has a string of thirty-four knock-outs in thirty-eight battles. This match is scheduled for twelve rounds. Jackson is recommended by his admirers as likely to interfere with Will's plans for the Dempsey bout. He is six feet two inches tall and weighs 210 pounds. In addition Jackson is said to be a capable boxer and a dangerous hitter.
A week after this match Will is scheduled to enter the ring against Tut Jackson, colored heavyweight of the Middle West. The pair are scheduled to clash for fifteen rounds at Ebbets Field, Brooklyn, on the night of Aug. 29. This match is regarded as an even more severe test for Will.

Manager Mullins said yesterday that he expects soon to close negotiations for several other matches for Will. The manager returned Friday from a trip to Montreal, after attending the funeral of Mike O'Dowd's mother in St. Paul. Mullins said he failed to accomplish any results in his quest for a Canadian site for a Dempsey-Will contest, but added that he had several propositions under consideration for bouts in which O'Dowd and Will will engage Canadian men of their respective weights.

O'Dowd Defeats Moore.
Columbus, Ohio, Aug. 15—Eddie O'Dowd, Columbus bantamweight, won the decision over Pat Moore of St. Paul here last night in a twelve round bout. O'Dowd drove Moore to the ropes with hard blows in the second and third rounds and obtained a lead which the southerner could not overcome.
Shade Knocked Out.
Woonsocket, R. I., Aug. 15—Jack Delaney, Bridgeport, Conn., knocked out George Shade of California, in the first round of what was to be a 12-round bout here tonight. The men are middleweights.

Joe Irvine Denies McIntyre's Claim.
Joe Irvine, the well-known local welterweight boxer who is now under the management of a local follower of boxing, has started active training in preparation for a series of bouts that in all probability will be definitely arranged within a short time. Irvine, and his manager take exception to Johnny McIntyre's claim to the maritime welterweight championship title, explaining that Irvine through his four-round win over McIntyre in Sydney (N. S.) is the possessor of the championship for this class.

McIntyre turned down an offer to meet Irvine in Houston recently but at any time after Sept. 15 Irvine is ready and willing to match up with McIntyre, the Utah Kid of Bangor or with any other worthy opponent of his class.
