

MARKED SUCCESS ATTENDS
FREDERICTON EVENTS IN
HONOR OF GOVERNOR-GENERAL
Degree Conferred at U. N. B.; Dinner at
Queen Hotel; The Duke's Interesting Reply
to Address of Hon. W. E. Foster

Fredericton, N. B., Dec. 3.—All the events arranged in honor of the visit of His Excellency the Governor-General were most successful.

After a civic luncheon at 1.30 o'clock His Excellency was given the honorary degree of Doctor of Laws at a special convocation of the University of New Brunswick this afternoon. A considerable number of undergraduates and alumni as well as the general public were present at the convocation which opened in the university at 4 o'clock.

The chair was taken by His Honor the Lieutenant-Governor, Hon. Wm. Pugsley, himself a distinguished graduate of the university. Among the others present were His Lordship, Bishop Richardson, Dr. L. W. Bailey, Dr. W. S. Carter, Rev. Dean Neales, Dr. W. W. White and the Earl of Ashburnham.

His Honor the Lieutenant-Governor, in an opening address, referred to the pleasing occasion of the special convocation and the honor of a visit of his majesty's representative, Sir Douglas Hazen followed with an address in which he gave an outline of the history of the university from its establishment and referred to its proud record during the war which ended so recently.

Dr. H. S. Bridges presented the candidate for the degree upon whom the degree was conferred by the chancellor, Dr. Jones.

His Excellency, after receiving the degree made an address in which he thanked the chancellor and senate of the university for the honor conferred upon him which he took as being given him the king's representative. He made reference to the age of the University of New Brunswick and achievements of its alumni which he believed would be emulated by those alumni yet to come. In his own case he hoped the university never would be disgraced by an act of its youngest alumnus.

Lieutenant-Governor Pugsley also spoke saying that it was a proud day for the university when the degree of Doctor of Laws was conferred upon so distinguished a gentleman, distinguished not only by his official position in Canada but also in Great Britain. His Excellency had referred to his office as representative of the king, and his personal work also has been recognized.

At the close of the convocation it was announced that Premier Foster extended an invitation to all the undergraduates to attend the reception to be given by His Excellency at the Parliament buildings.

INSPECTORS FIND
NEED FOR CHANGES
PROHIBITORY ACT

That the present method of handling liquor under the Prohibition Act in certain instances was one of the important suggestions handed out yesterday at a conference of the provincial liquor inspectors over which Rev. W. D. Wilson, chief inspector, presided.

The meeting was called for the purpose of a thorough and open discussion of the strong and weak points of the prohibition act now in force in New Brunswick and to ascertain the difficulties encountered in various provincial localities in the enforcement of the act. Places, where it is thought that better results may be obtained were thoroughly gone over yesterday and several timely suggestions were received and noted.

There was a strong opinion and opinion that the law should be amended in certain respects especially to check the use and sale of extracts which is now considered one of the growing and serious problems of the prohibition law. It was unanimously agreed that the disposition of liquor by vendors should be changed to cash.

The chief inspector led in a discussion of the aims and objects of the liquor act, and the liquor act, gave a short talk on the duties of police officers in respect to the enforcement of the prohibition act.

When you do, you will understand why thousands of families use world over, for that they could hardly keep house without it. It's simple and cheap, but the way it takes hold of a cough will quickly earn it a permanent place in your home.

Into a quart jar pour 1/2 cup of Pinex (50 cents worth); then add plain granulated sugar syrup to fill up usually in 24 hours or less. It seems to penetrate the throat, every air passage, loosens a dry, hoarse or tight cough, never spoils, and gives you 10 ounces of better cough remedy than you could buy ready-made for five times its cost.
