## RECENT DEATHS

William Messer of Tweedside, York  
Co., died on Dec. 18. He was a native  
of Northumberland, England, and was  
eighty-one years of age. He leaves his  
wife, six sons, three daughters and sixty  
grandchildren.

J. A. Stewart, of Fredericton, received  
a telegram on Tuesday afternoon con-  
veying news of the death of his brother,  
Bruce, in the General Hospital at Cal-  
gary, Alta. The deceased was twenty-  
five years of age and is survived by his  
parents, Mr. and Mrs. T. A. Stewart,  
of Williamsdale, Cumberland County, N.  
S., and three brothers, John A. of Fred-  
ericton, W. E. and Alward at home. The  
late Mr. Stewart is a nephew of Dou-  
glas Stewart of the department of justice  
at Ottawa, and the late J. J. Stewart,  
formerly editor and proprietor of the  
Halifax Herald.

At Salmon River, Colchester County,  
on Monday, James K. Eaton, C. E., one  
of the prominent engineers of Nova  
Scotia, died. As a civil engineer he  
worked at most of the railways in Nova  
Scotia and later was engaged as Crown  
Land Surveyor of Colchester County. His  
immediate family he leaves a widow, three  
sons and three daughters. The sons are  
Major D. I. V. Eaton, now at the front  
in France; Captain Edwin K. Eaton, at  
Bermuda with the R. C. R., and Captain  
R. B. Eaton, M. P. P., Alberta. (The  
daughters are Mrs. M. M. Hopkins, Val-  
dez, Alaska, and Miss Lucy Eaton at  
home.)

The body of Major George Dennison,  
R. E., whose death took place in Sas-  
katchewan last Saturday, passed through  
the city yesterday morning en route for  
Dublin, Ireland, accompanied by Perci-  
val Dennison, also of Saskatchewan.

Mrs. Edward Phillips died on Wednes-  
day at her home in St. George. She is  
survived by her husband and six child-  
ren.

## A CHANGE IN CHICAGO

(From the Wheeling Register)  
Whether it is merely a "freak" verdict  
or the beginning of a new order of  
things, a Chicago jury's return of a ver-  
dict of guilty against two women ac-  
cused of murder is so unusual that it is  
being generally commented on by the  
press. The defendants, a mother and  
daughter, resented the "dunning" of a  
neighbor who had loaned them money  
and finally made him a revolver target,  
with fatal result.

The unusual thing about the verdict  
is not the conviction in such a plain case  
of guilt, but the fact that in seventeen  
cases immediately preceding this in-  
which women were tried for murder the  
defendants were acquitted. It is asserted  
that in each of these cases the proof  
of guilt was complete and convincing,  
but that the gallantry of male jurors  
seemingly caused them to look upon sex  
as a sufficient excuse for murder.  
The situation in Chicago became so  
serious that there was talk of asking the  
legislature to enact a law to permit the  
selection of a female jury to try women.  
If the new precedent established is not  
merely the exception which proves the  
rule the very unusual expedient of fe-  
male juries will be unnecessary.

## GOOD WILL AMONG FOES

Lloyd George Tells of Examples on  
Battlefield

London, Dec. 19.—Chancellor Lloyd  
George has contributed a message to the  
Christmas number of the Methodist  
Times, in which he says:

"I recently visited one of the battle-  
fields of France. I saw in a village be-  
ing shelled by German guns a prisoner  
of war just being brought into the  
French lines. He was in a motor car  
under guard. He was wounded and look-  
ed ill and in pain.

"The French general with whom I  
had gone into the front went up to the  
wounded Prussian and told him he need  
not worry; he would be taken straight  
to the hospital and looked after as if  
he were one of our own men. The Prus-  
sian replied: 'We treated your wounded  
exactly in the same way.'

"It was a curious rivalry under these  
conditions; for you could hear the 'vis-  
age' of the German shells and the moun-  
dering crack with which they exploded,  
dealing out death and destruction in the  
French trenches close by. We were in  
sight of a powerful French battery  
which was preparing to send its deadly  
messages into the Prussian ranks.

A little farther on I marvelled that  
this exhibition of good will among the  
men who were sworn foes should be  
possible amid such surroundings until  
my eyes happened to wander down a  
lane where I saw a long row of wagons,  
each marked with a great red cross.  
Then I knew who had taught those  
brave men the lesson of humanity: that  
will gradually, surely, over-throw  
the reign of hate. Christ had not died in  
vain."

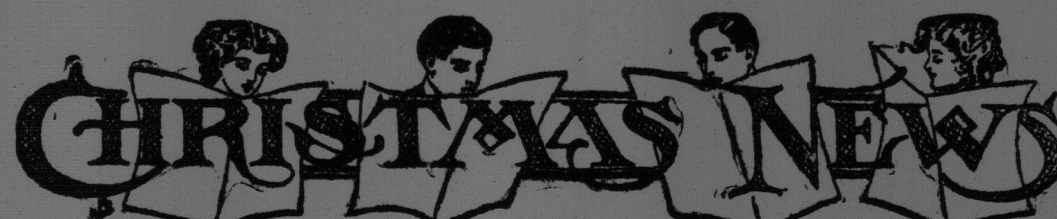
