DR. PUGSLEY TELLS OF GREAT HARBOR WORK

Great Development on West Side Ready for Tenders as Soon as Transfer is Completed—New Post Office a Handsome Building

Additional information in reference to the great works under way or to be carried out by the Dominion government on the western side of St. John harbor was given in an interview with Hon. Mr. Pugsley, minister of public works, last evening.

"The first work will consist of the building of a wharf from the harbor line to the southward of Sand Point inshore to and upon the 400-foot strip, so called, a distance of about 800 feet, then extending southward on the 400-foot strip a distance of about 800 feet.

"This will form a part of the system of wharves to be constructed, and will, soon as completed, form a protection for the filling in to be done by the C. P. R. on its property and by the government on the inner portion of the 400-foot strip which is to be transferred to the crown.

"The dredging for this work will be done to a depth of forty feet in order that accommodation may be afforded in future for the largest vessels which may come to the port, when further dredging may be done without interfering with the wharves. At present the dredging for the ship berths is being done to a depth of thirty-two feet at low tide.

"An immense deal of work has been done in dredging for the wharves and ship berths, and the requisite depth has now practically been obtained for the first series of new wharves.

"I conferred with the resident engineer, Mr. Sheehan, who is in charge of the work, on Monday, and am greatly pleased with the splendid progress which has been made by the dredging fleet, and also with the work recently done by the Stoneliter in removing very large boulders, which were encountered during the progress of the dredging work.

"The channel entrance will soon be of sufficient depth to enable the largest steamers, such as the Empresses, to enter and leave the port at all stages of tide. This is very important because it will prevent delay to the vessels which have hitherto taken place and which has been regarded by steamship companies as a serious drawback.

"In this connection I might mention that, in addition to the building of the west side wharves, there is still another great work of improvement to be done upon the harbor, and that is the extension of the harbor breakwater to the westward of the breakwater to the harbor line, which has been found necessary to delay entering upon this work, owing to the fact that the breakwater not only prevents silt from again interfering with the depth of the channel, but will afford a very sheltered anchorage for smaller vessels in the locality which will be entirely protected from south-west gales.

"The work already done by the government on the west side, and in improving the entrance to the harbor, will be accepted by our citizens as an earnest of the recognition of the advantages of the harbor of St. John as one of the national ports of Canada, and of the intention of the government to complete the work which is necessary to make it a thoroughly commodious and up-to-date harbor.

Asked about the Courtenay Bay wharf, Hon. Mr. Pugsley said: "The tenders will close on Thursday next, Aug. 10, and while I do not know definitely, I have reason to believe that a number of tenders will be submitted as several very prominent and wealthy contracting firms have had engineers for some months carefully studying the project and have asked for forms of tender. Nothing will be known, however, until the tenders are opened at the latter part of this week."

Hon. Mr. Pugsley was asked relative to the establishment of a shipbuilding plant and for the building of war vessels. "As to this," he said, "my lips are necessarily sealed until after the council has met."

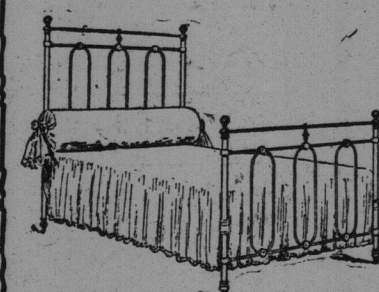

LIBERALS IN LINE FOR THE CAMPAIGN

Kings-Albert Convention This Afternoon and St. John and Westmorland Tomorrow—Col. McLean's Meeting Successful—A. E. Wall in Digby

A large attendance is assured at the meeting to be held this afternoon at 4 o'clock in Sussex, to select a candidate for the constituency of Kings-Albert. A feature of the meeting will be Hon. Dr. Pugsley's address.

The candidates for St. John city and county will be chosen tomorrow night at a meeting of the delegates in the Queen's Hall. After the meeting a ratification conference will take place. The Liberals of Westmorland will also make their choice tomorrow at Moncton. That both the farmers and fishermen of

Charlotte county were awake to the advantages of reciprocity and to the benefits to be derived from the treaty, was the statement made by W. F. Todd, M. P., of St. Stephen who arrived in the city yesterday. He felt that the Liberal majority not only in New Brunswick but throughout the whole Dominion would be increased.

The opening meeting of the campaign in Queens county held yesterday afternoon at Chipman was a rousing triumph for the Liberal party. Col. McLean, M. P., and reciprocity. A hearty reception was given the popular member for Queens, as well as Hon. C. W. Robinson, M. P., and A. B. Copp, M. P., who delivered addresses. Senator King presided and some musical selections were given by members of the 14th band of Moncton. All the speakers laid stress on the importance and advantages of reciprocity, and their remarks were heartily applauded. Hearty cheers for Sir Wilfrid Laurier and Col. McLean closed the meeting.

A. E. Wall, M. P., of Digby N. S., was yesterday chosen as the Liberal candidate for that place. The convention which selected him was the largest political meeting ever held in Digby county, every polling district being represented. That both the farmers and fishermen of

THE NIOBE AT HALIFAX

The Canadian cruiser Niobe was towed into Halifax last evening after a tow of twenty four hours from Clark's Harbor, the weather being thick all the way. The British cruiser Cornwall and Government steamer Lady Laurier brought the Niobe around, the former ahead and the latter alongside the disabled vessel. The Cornwall will go into dock first, as it is feared that she is seriously damaged, so the result of her touching the rocks.
