

BENEFIT GAINED FROM INTERNATIONAL SPORT IS QUESTIONED

GOOD FEELING BETWEEN U.S. AND ENGLAND

While There Was Friction at Paris, English and Americans Get on Well

LONDON, Aug. 2.—Since several incidents happened during the Olympic games in Paris two years ago, in which demonstrations both vocal and physical were given against American spectators and athletes, it has been disputed whether international competition in sports did or did not promote better international feeling.

It is beyond argument, however, that the visit of the American golf and tennis teams to England this season made a most favorable impression on the British people and promoted a better understanding among all those who met at the various tournaments.

Bobby Jones is just as popular in England and Scotland as he is in the United States and Helen Willis has just as many partisan rooters here as she has in California, where the crown of a queen wouldn't be any too good for her.

The impression that the Walker Cup golfers made upon the Scottish people was distinctly favorable. The spirit of friendship that the Walker Cup golfers created was manifested a few hours after the first round of the tournament.

But it was later in the evening when the real spirit of friendship developed. The Americans who had been given honorary memberships in the club gathered in the club house to celebrate the victory.

The celebration naturally led to the point where the strains of "Sweet Adeline," "My Honey Honey," and "East Side, West Side" floated into the still night air.

"This is quite astounding," it never has happened before," a steward remarked with an expression of amazement on his face.

He explained that it was one of the most dignified of all golf clubs, that the lounge never raised their voices above a whisper and that carpet slippers were too loud in the corridors and smoking rooms.

The dignified and honorable members, however, did not take offense. They held out for some time but eventually they were in the chorus and before the session had reached its half-way stage they knew the words of the three masterpieces and were doing their best to strike a good minor.

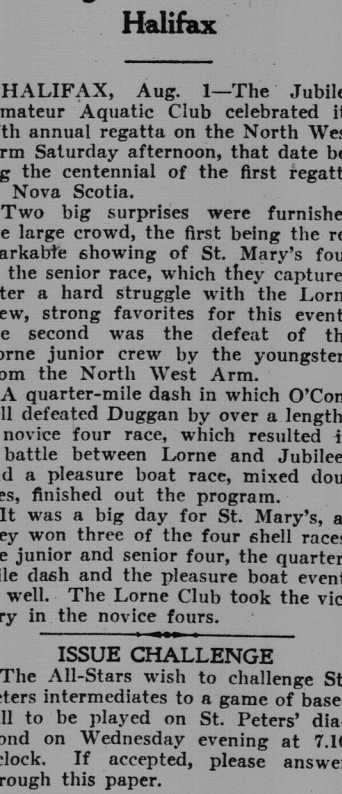

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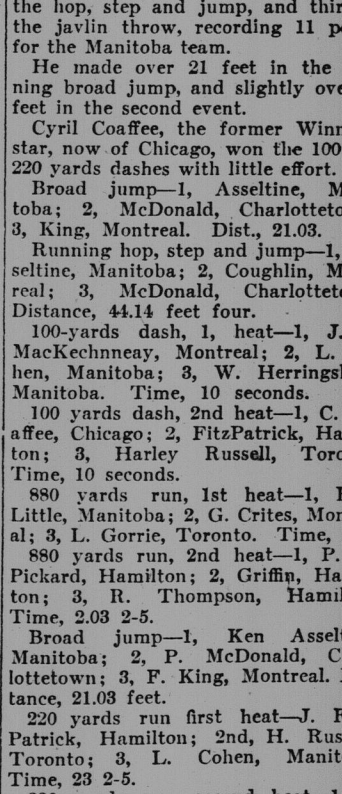
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MANITOBA LEADS IN CHAMPIONSHIPS

DOES THE PITCHER RECEIVE CREDIT FOR A STRIKEOUT IF THE BATSMAN REACHES FIRST BASE ON A THIRD STRIKE THAT IS A WILD PITCH?

Despite the fact that the batsman runs on what is a third strike, the pitcher does not receive credit for a strike-out.

Instead, the pitcher is charged with an error for having made a wild pitch for the third strike.

The wild pitch is considered responsible for the batsman reaching first.

Therefore, the pitcher should be penalized instead of rewarded, so he is charged with an error and not given credit for a strikeout.

On the other hand, if the catcher drops the third strike and a passed ball that enables the batsman to reach first, the catcher gets an error and the pitcher is credited with a strikeout.
