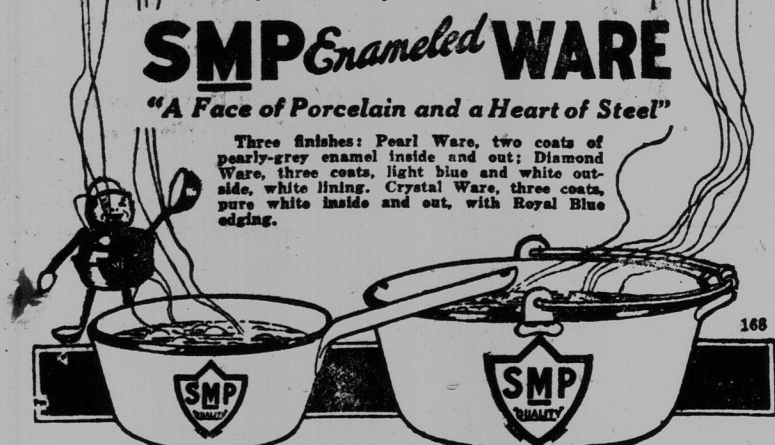

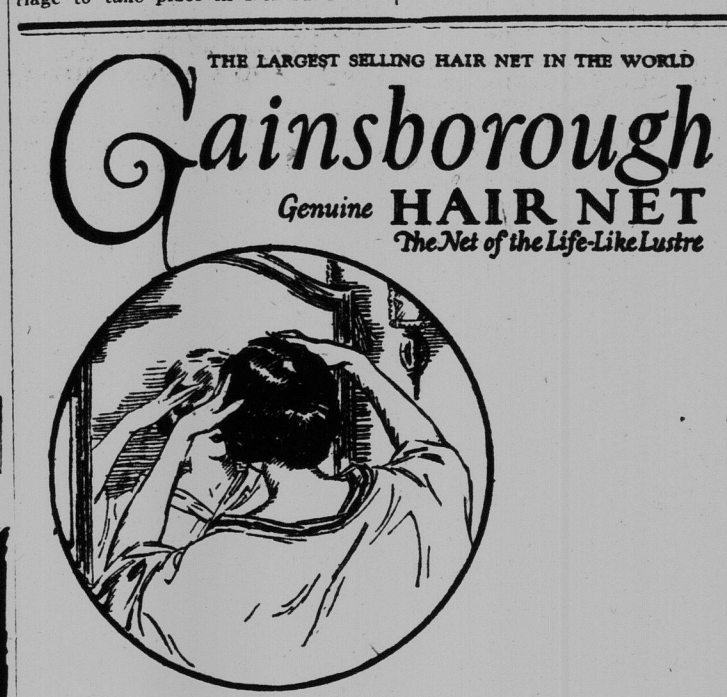
### RECENT WEDDINGS

**ADMIT NO MEN IN  
REGULAR COURSES**

Lectures in McGill School of Physical Education to Start on September 19.

The syllabus for the 1923-24 session of the School of Physical Education has just been issued by McGill University, and contains the information that registration this year will take place during the week commencing September 11. Lectures will begin on September 19, and will be concluded on April 30, until which date practical work will be conducted for both first and second years.

For juniors the programme includes: English, physics, chemistry, general anatomy and physiology, osteology and myology, voice development and training, theory of physical education, class management and teaching, first aid, playground problems, gymnastics, dancing, aquatics and practice teaching. The senior course, in addition, includes lectures in kinesiology and applied anatomy, psychology, physiology of exercise, physical diagnosis, remedial gymnastics, anthropometry, preventive medicine, organization and administration, child welfare, history (physical education) and remedial gymnastics and massage. For the session 1923-24 only women students will be admitted to the regular courses. Partial students, both men and women, will be admitted
