

In the year 1873, a large and handsome Chapel, capable of containing more than three hundred worshippers, and a spacious Dining Hall, were erected at the east end of the new School building. The Chapel was opened for Divine Service by the Lord Bishop of Toronto, on Sunday, March 29th, 1874; the Dining Hall was formally opened on the 5th of November, 1873, by the Most Reverend A. Oxenden, D.C.L., Lord Bishop of Montreal and Metropolitan. During the year 1877, the interior of the Chancel of the Chapel was beautifully decorated and completely furnished from designs by Frank Darling, Esquire, Architect, Toronto, as a memorial to the late Rev. Frederick Alexander Bethune, M.A., who died on the 20th of January, 1877, at Cannes, in France, and who had been for nine years an assistant master in the School. The Chancel was re-opened for Divine Service on the 18th of October.

At the western end of the original range of buildings there was added, during the year 1874, a large wing running north and south, with projecting towers on the west and south fronts. This addition contains spacious Class-rooms, School-hall, Dormitories for about seventy more Boys, and apartments for an increased staff of Masters and Servants. The completed buildings now present a south front of 300 feet in length, and a west front of 80 feet. They afford abundant room and every appliance for a School of at least 150 Boys.

During the year 1875, about ten acres of land adjoining the original School property on the west side
