STRIKE AT GUELPH.

ITALIAN LABORERS OUT FOR NINE-HOUR DAY.

Guelph, Oct. 27.—About a hundred Italian laborers employed upon the waterworks construction by Contractor Conn of Windsor went on strike this morning, and are now out for a nine-hour day at the present wage, \$1.75. They claim that they have already made concessions for rubber boots and tools, and that they cannot work ten hours a day when it takes an hour and a half to get out from the city.

A SIX CENT CRIMINAL

TRUCKMAN IS ON SUSPENDED SENTENCE FOR A TECHNICAL THEFT.

Toronto, Oct. 27.—John Lusche, a C. P. R. truckman, was brought into Police Court on a theft charge this morning because he picked up a few loose candies out of a box in the freight sheds and ate them. The total value of the stolen confectionery has been fixed at six cents. A detective of the railway corporation laid the weighty matter before Magistrate Denison.

Lusche admitted having stolen the candies. He was wheeling the box on a truck, he said, when a jolt threw the box off and broke open the lid. Some of the candies fell on the floor and he took a few.

"I suppose," said the Magistrate with a peculiar smile, turning to the sleuth, "this is technically a theft, but it does seem cruel to me to bring a man here on such a charge. I will adjourn it until called on."

SPORTING NEWS

HOCKEY.

THE INGERSOLL TEAM.

With the season not far distant interest is growing as to the personnel of the team that will represent Ingersoll in the O. H. A. intermediate series. Last season's players, who are available, as well as a number of candidates for a place on the line-up, are evincing a keen interest in the preliminary training. While it is too early to state definitely who will compose the team enough is known to warrant the belief that it will be as strong, if not stronger than last year. The old players feel that they are still good for many a hard contest and they want to see the intermediate championship brought to Ingersoll before hanging up their sticks.

Jay Thompson, the former Woodstock and London player, has located in Simcoe, where he has been since 21st. He will play with the Simcoe intermediates, who expect to have a good season in the big rink, which was opened last winter.

THE LONDON CLUB.

London, Oct. 27.—At last the local hockey team has been organized and all is in readiness for the active work of getting the team, which is to represent London on the ice this year, in shape.

A meeting of the hockey enthusiasts was held on Saturday night. After the routine business had been concluded the prospects for the season just about to start were discussed, it being the unanimous opinion that a team fully as strong as that which brought credit upon London last year can be put on the ice. Bole and Thompson, of last year's team, have left the city, but all the other old players are anxious to get back

into the game, while it is felt the vacancies in the team can be well filled from the other material in the city.

The management have stated distinctly their intention to give all a fair chance for the team. Places will be given strictly on merit and young players will be given every encouragement.

It was decided to nominate for the executive of the O. H. A. Mr. W. P. Irving, the well-known referee, and if hard work will accomplish his election, Mr. Irving will be one of the chosen few on this body. London is the center of a great hockey district, and it is felt that it should have a representative.

LONDON WILL BE STRONG.

The Free Press: On the first of November the hockey players hoping to represent London in the intermediate series of the Ontario Hockey Association will start active training. It is the intention of the executive to secure the services of a competent trainer, one who will be able to advise the men as to the best way of getting in shape, and thus it is expected all the players will be ready for good work when the cold weather comes and makes the actual play possible. London is going to have a strong hockey team. The executive newly appointed state this without any hesitation, and there does not seem to be any great reason to doubt their assertion.

LACROSSE.

CANADIANS WIN.

London, Oct. 24.—The Olympic lacrosse match was played today at the Stadium between the United Kingdom and Canada. The only teams entered.

McLeod, Fyon and Mara were omitted from the Canadian team. The Canadians soon gained a lead, Gorman scoring in two minutes, but Buckland scored for England immediately after. Broderick scored another and Turnbull two before quarter time.

After quarter time the Englishmen picked up, and a ding-dong contest followed, the half time score being Canada 6, United Kingdom 2.

With but fifteen minutes to play the score was a tie—9 all, but in the last quarter Canada pulled away, scoring five goals while the United Kingdom were scoring one.

The Canadians are thus Olympic lacrosse champions by 14 to 10. Great excitement was produced by the match, especially when England drew even. The Canadian players rallied splendidly, however, completely outmarching their opponents.

Lord Roberts and Lord Desborough congratulated the Canadians after the match.

LONGBOAT THE WINNER.

Montreal, Oct. 24.—The Montreal Star road race was run off this afternoon in beautiful weather and the

crowds on the streets were something never before seen in Montreal.

The reception of Longboat, the Indian, was the greatest ever given to an athlete in this city, and he deserves the greatest credit for running the race as he did.

He clipped over one minute off the record by covering the course in the time of 1:25.44. His run, considering the streets, which were in somewhat poor condition and other obstacles in the way, was something marvelous.

The Indian got away to a good start and was never headed. The second man to cross the tape was Hans Holmer, the best eastern man.

The first Montreal man to finish was Woods of the Gordons, and his place was third.

The Irish-Canadians got the team prize by a score of 24 to 32, Halifax being second.

RUGBY.

TIGERS DEFEAT MONTREAL.

Hamilton, Oct. 24.—In a sea of mud the Tigers and Montreal team battled this afternoon, the game being exceedingly close after the first quarter, in which the Tigers had everything their own way. It was expected that the game would be little better than a workout for the Tigers, but Montreal showed unexpected speed, and gave the Tigers a great run for the game.

The score was Tigers 18; Montreal 7.

Highwaymen Sentenced.

Montreal, Oct. 24.—Judge Choquette sentenced two highwaymen to the penitentiary yesterday. They were Fred Cawthorne and George Duffy. On Oct. 1 they beat and robbed Mr. C. A. E. Reid, jeweler, who was on his way home. They gave him a severe beating, and stole a watch valued at \$500 and a ring valued at \$700. Cawthorne got 14 years and Duffy 10 years.

Big Pulp Shipment.

Clarke City, Que., Oct. 24.—The largest cargo of wood pulp ever sent out of Canada is now being loaded on the steamship Kristiania at Seven Islands, from which port she will sail in a few days from London. The cargo will be over 5,000 tons, and is the product of the new mill at this place.

To Protect Miners.

Washington, Oct. 24.—Important suggestions for minimizing loss of life in the coal mines in the United States are contained in a report submitted to President Roosevelt through Secretary Garfield by the three foreign mining experts who have investigated conditions.

Value Crop at \$125,000,000.

Ottawa, Oct. 24.—According to advices received at the Department of Trade and Commerce from official sources at Winnipeg the total cash value of the western grain crop will be approximately \$125,000,000. This exceeds former estimates by several millions.

NEWS IN BRIEF.

A rural mail route from Milton to Mount Nemo has been established.

E. Burke, of Gainsboro', Sask., has just marketed 23,000 bushels of wheat. John Fortella, a negro, who murdered Mrs. Jenkins at Vancouver, will be hanged on December 18.

The first lot of rural mail delivery boxes had to be imported out the rest will be made in Canada.

The Indians on the Blood reserve in Manitoba raised 24,000 bushels of wheat.

James Jenkins, accused of killing Mrs. Mary Morrison near Hazelmore, B.C., is declared to be sane, and will be tried for murder.

Prof. J. W. Mitchell of the Kingston Dairy School has resigned to go to the staff of Manitoba Agricultural College.

Thirteen strike-breakers brought over by the C. P. R. are to be deported.

Simon O'Grady, a Nepean township farmer, has been missing since Sunday night, Oct. 18th.

Ontario's wheat yield this year totalled 17,264,000 bushels or 21 bushels per acre.

Henry Steeper of McGillivray township, who was drawn into a threshing machine, is dead of his injuries.

Some steamer carried away the buoy which marked Bar Point channel in the Detroit River.

Taxation of the civil servants means an increase of \$800,000 in Ottawa's civic revenue.

General Order inspected the 13th Regiment of Hamilton on Thursday night.

TEN NIGHT RIDERS

ARE UNDER ARREST FOR MURDER IN TENNESSEE.

Samburg, Tenn., Oct. 25.—The number of mob suspects in custody charged with implication in the murder of Capt. Rankin and the assault upon Colonel Taylor is now ten. The men taken in last night's raid include many, died yesterday that he was forced under threats of death to accompany the mob on Monday night when the two attorneys were taken from a hotel by night riders.

When court convenes Monday it is promised that evidence will be forthcoming which will assure the indictment of practically the entire band of night riders.

Broken Leg Fatal.

Vancouver, B.C., Oct. 24.—Mrs. Van Rikding, a visitor here from Guelph, died yesterday morning in the general hospital. She was stopping at the Hotel Vancouver and accidentally broke her leg the other day. She did not recover from the shock.

Farmer Missing.

Ottawa, Oct. 24.—Simon O'Grady, a wealthy Carlton County farmer, has been missing from his home since Sunday night. It is supposed that he has drowned himself. He was in a despondent mood on Sunday. He is 44 years of age and unmarried.

Cre Cars Wrecked.

Belleville, Oct. 24.—By the breaking of a flange a freight train was wrecked near Lambton Station, and six cars loaded with ore were derailed and badly smashed. The track was badly torn up. The damage to rolling stock will be considerable.

Grain Men Incorporated.

Ottawa, Oct. 24.—Incorporation has been granted the Central Grain Co. of Winnipeg. The capital stock is \$199,000. The provisional directors are: E. E. Hall, Donald Morrison, Charles J. McFall, Chas. S. Blanchard and Stewart Murray.

Hon. James Duff Elected.

Collingwood, Oct. 24.—Hon. James Duff, Sir James Whitney's new Minister of Agriculture, was re-elected by acclamation at the nomination for the bye-election yesterday afternoon. The riding is flattered by his being chosen for the position.

Schooner Runs Ashore.

Kingston, Oct. 24.—At an early hour yesterday the schooner Fordriver ran aground in Navy Bay in heavy smoke, laden with coal, and had to be lighted before released. Capt. Daryeau said he could not see the length of the vessel.

Rural Delivery in Halton.

Milton, Oct. 24.—The Postoffice Department has established a rural mail delivery route between Milton and Mount Nemo. The first mail was delivered this morning.
