FIGURES FROM THE ANNUAL STATEMENTS OF SOME OF THE FACTORIES—A GOOD YEAR.

Total milk received for cheese 3,694,573 lbs.; cheese manufactured 331,942 lbs.; total milk received for butter 150,572 lbs.; butter manufactured 23,547 lbs.; value of cheese \$43,396.07; value of butter \$7,265.99; total receipts \$50,742.04; average milk per lb. of cheese 11.13; average price per pound of cheese 13 cents.

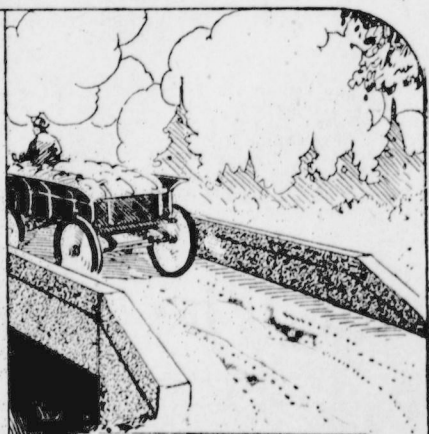
