## SAMOA.

Reports of a shocking tragedy at Atia have been received, says the Samoan Herald of May 18. A quarrel had arisen between two families, or two sections of one family, which ended in a fight between the two sections. Three were engaged on one side and seven on the other, and the weapons used were rifles and knives. Of the three two were killed and one on the other side. Several were wounded somewhat serionsly. One of those killed had his head taken off and another was literally cut in halves. The whole affair was a purely domestic or tribal quarrel, and has no political significance.

## AUSTRALIA.

Dull, foggy mornings, bright, fine, dry days, and cool nights have been in force during the last week. Coast districts are in a fair condition, and are much better circumstanced than the Central Division. In the latter, two dry months have had a bad effect. There is plenty of grass, but it is dry. Ploughing cannot be done, and there is a feeling that if rain does not come it will be useless. as heavy frosts are certain to follow the moisture. Out in the West drought is in full force, and grass and herbage are so very scarce that the various scrubs are being vigously attacked. Although this is not a pleasing outlook, it is not probable that the winter of 1895 will rank as a very disastrous one. More than three-fourths of the colony are up to the average winter condition, and have both grass and water. 'There will be losses, but the total of these are likely to appear as insignficant when compared with the effects of former droughts.

It is stated on the authority of a telegram received by the commissioner of police at Perth that a tremendously rich shoot of gold has been struck in the underlay of the Londonderry mine.

A grand sight was witnessed on board the ship Tweedsdale, which arrived at Sydney recently from Rio de Janeiro. It was during an electrical storm on 24th April, while the ship was crossing the Southern ocean. The whole vessel, her mests, yards, and rigging became covered with small balls of fire or corposants, which danced about the vards and the rigging in an extraordinary feshion. Cateruillars Stripping the Fruit Trees Across the Sound. Whatcom, June 10 .- Myriads of calerpillars infest the orchards and groves in some sections of this county and especially along the Nooksack river. On the

Lummi reservation they have stripped thousands of fruit and other trees of their foliage, and in infested orchards where no efforts have been made to check their ravages they have almost entirely destroyed the fruit crop. The ministers give no heed to public business, but scheme only to enrich themselves; some by negotiating with Russia for the sale of a port on the eastern coast; others by offering counter proposals to European powers opposed to Russian aggrandizement; and still others by conniving at the return of the Ming exiles who were driven out of the country for their crimes when China's influence was overthrown. Two of the Mings are said to have been brought in disguise to the neighborhood of Seoul, where they await the Queen's signal to demand recognition from the feeble King. Count Inouye has not yet found the way to bring order out of the Corean chaos, and it is reported that, sick and weary of

the struggle, he is about to leave the country. Unless he can be dissuaded from this step, the Coreans will assume that Japan has decided to abandon her task of regenerating the wretched kingdom, and the government will fall to utter degradation. If Japan's restraining influence is removed, nothing can prevent the Queen from reviving the corrupt system of former years. Their home is in the wilderness of mountain peaks and narrow, rocky valleys, where nothing will grow except a tuft of broom corn here and there in the crevices of the rocks of the mountain sides, and a few stocks of millet in a casual square yard of soil in the valleys. It is not difficult to forecast the probable result of the starvation of this race of beggars should the report turn out to be correct. Driven desperate by hunger, the people will endeavor to obtain food from Gawar and other outside districts, and there will be fights with the Turkish troops, the vil lages will be attacked and some of the wretched people killed, and no man can prophesy where the persecution will end. I have just returned from a rapid journey to the Kurdistan mountains for the ourpose of investigating the report that ourteen villages had been attacked and devastated by a raid of Kurds last week. The original rumor had it that the Kurds had massacred many Christians and had carried off women and girls to the mountains. After riding day and night o reach the scene of the raid, L at length arrived at the Merguiver valley, which ies like the bottom of a boat beneath huge mountains covered from base to summit with almost unbroken expanses of snow. It was in this valley that the raid took place. It is said a band of Kurds from the mountains had indeed raided fourteen villages in this valley, but the raid was directed against other

Kurds and not against Christians. There were a few Nestorian Christians living in the valley, but they were not molested in any way. As this was not a race or religious raid will probably have little interest out side of the valley. I regret to say that
