ENGLISH MAGICIAN EXPOSES THE WINDSOR GHOST FAKES

American Society for Psychological Research Finds That the Nova Scotian Town is Full of Practical Jokers

Results of investigations made by Professor James H. Hyslop since he took as an assistant and secretary Hereward Carrington, a well known English magician, given in the last number of the proceedings of the American Society for Psychological Research, were issued on Thursday.

At the direction of the professor, Mr. Carrington paid a visit to Windsor, Nova Scotia, where wonderful things were supposed to be happening. Hogheads rolled into the streets urged by unseen hands, apples went spinning through the air from nowhere and cases of eggs were smashed in the twinkling of an eye when no one was near.

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
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THE OLD HOUSE IN LONDON IN WHICH ROBINSON CRUSOE WAS WRITTEN

SUICIDED BECAUSE HE COULD NOT BURN ASHES

Prominent Altoona Physician Who Backed John Ellmore's Scheme Was Twitted by Friends Over Its Failure.

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CHEERFUL FUNERALS ARE URGED BY PASTORS

LONDON, July 5.—There is at least one man in London who is in accord with Mark Train's idea of a jolly funeral.

The Rev. Frederick Spurr, one of the best known Baptist pastors in London, started the mothers at the funeral of one of the deacons of his church on Thursday by officiating in a gray suit of clothes.

Yesterday the reverend gentleman, who is the minister of the Maze Pond Baptist church in the Old Kent road, gave his reasons.

"In the first place," said Mr. Spurr, "I do not believe in death, and I think that if people bustled themselves preparing how to live instead of preparing how to die, the world would be a better place.

"I am heartily sick of the paganism that is connected with a good many Christian funerals. If we honestly believe that a good Christian has gone into a higher and truer life, why should we wear clothes even suggesting that he is dead and done with?"

"It was Charles Dickens' protest in all his works and in future I will not conduct funerals in a black suit. I would rather wear a white cassock-triple than a black suit.

"In his particular case the deceased was 82 years of age, and a man who had been a good Christian all his life. He died of old age 80 at his funeral. I wore a gray suit and we sang an Easter hymn.

"I do not believe in wearing black at all. I know one case in which a man and woman buried their child. They and their family were dressed in the deepest black and had an altogether too expensive funeral. That night they were both intoxicated.

"Incidents of this kind are simply gruesome, and I shall always contend against the waste of money on funerals, especially for buying black clothes."
