JILTED BY LOVER MODEL SUICIDES
Dramatic Tragedy Stirs France
---Renounced in Public, Ar-
tist's Model Blows Head Off
With Gun.

MAINTENANCE SUR-SEINE, FRANCE, OCT. 8.
The villa of Daniel Ridgway, Knight
of the American painter at Rolleboise,
overlooking the Seine, was the scene
of a dramatic tragedy Wednesday.
Armande Pissini, a 17-year old girl re-
nowned throughout the countryside
for her beauty, who served Mr. Knight
in the double capacity of domestic
and model, after being publicly jilted
at a village ball by her lover, Gustave
Fortune, returned to Mr. Knight's
home, took the painter's shotgun and
placed the barrel under her chin,
blew off her head. Mr. Knight found
the body of the girl the following
morning upon his return from Paris.

AT VIENNA.
The newspapers trace the Kaiser's
championship of the Princess to his
last visit to Vienna, when they say
he remarked upon her absence among
the exalted personages assembled
at the State banquet he insisted
upon her presence, refusing to go to the
table until she arrived. The matter
was referred to Emperor Francis Jos-
eph, who assented, and the Archduke
Franz Ferdinand drove to his palace
and brought his wife to the banquet.
The Kaiser and Kaiserin there and
elsewhere paid marked attention to
the Princess on Hohenberg, who
during her visit here, will be treated
with every respect and all the honors
due to a crown princess. The news-
papers urge the Kaiser to make sim-
ilar efforts to break the etiquette in
favor of the minor courts of Germany
where it corresponds with that of the
Austrian court.

Scott Act Cases.
Before His Honor Mr. Justice Mc-
Keown in supreme court chambers on
Saturday morning, Mr. D. Mullin, K.
C., acting for William Monahan, of
Sunbury county, applied for a writ
of certiorari in two Scott Act cases.
Monahan, of the Parish of Gladstone,
Sunbury county, is the defendant in
both. On the 2nd inst., he was con-
victed before Thomas L. Alexander,
parish court commissioner. His Honor
granted Mr. Mullin's application and
ordered a stay of proceedings pending
the opinion of the appellate court. The
case will be argued at the November
term.
