

NORTH SHORE TOWNS WANT IMPROVEMENTS

Delegations Appointed to Urge for More Subsidies to Ferry Steamers and Better Wharves.

Newcastle, Mar. 4.—At a special meeting of Newcastle board of trade last night, Mayor McMurdo, ex-Mayor Hennessy, manager McCurdy of the Royal Bank and R. A. Murdoch were appointed a committee to act with similar committees from Newcastle town council, (Aids, Clark, Leighton and Morrison.) Chairman council, Newcastle and Chatham boards of trade, and the Newcastle Steamboat Co. to interview the provincial government to ask for increased subsidies for the Newcastle-Chatham Head and Chatham-Ferryville ferries and the provision of a new wharf at Redbank, another between Redbank and the Northwest Bridge, the fixing up of other wharves and their approaches, and the lighting of the draw in the Northwest Bridge during the navigation season.
The delegation purpose going to Fredericton next week.
The two companies claim that they have lost money on their ferry boats and unless extra subsidies are forthcoming, will have to take the boats off the route.

WOODSTOCK HAS A \$4,000 BLAZE

Woodstock Woodworking Company Suffered from Fire on Sunday Afternoon—Rev. G. D. Ireland's Farewell.

Woodstock, Mar. 6.—Shortly after noon on Sunday fire caught from a defective fuse in the office of the Woodstock Woodworking Company, adjoining the factory. The fire responded promptly and succeeded in preventing the flames spreading to the factory.
The office and warehouse were completely destroyed together with stock of moulding, sashes and doors valued at \$4,000. The building was insured for \$200 and the stock for \$800.
The Rev. George D. Ireland for the past 12 years pastor of St. Paul's Presbyterian church preached his farewell sermon Sunday evening to a large congregation. It is said the congregation will extend a call to Rev. Frank Baird, of Sussex.
Robert King, superintendent of this division of the C. P. R., and highly respected in the community, has been transferred to Toronto. He will be succeeded by Mr. Parnshaw, of Toronto.

S. R. O. IN NEW YORK HOSPITALS

Serious Hospital Shortage Is Threatened in Gotham—All The Institutions Filled And Many Turned Away.

New York, N. Y., Mar. 5.—New York is threatened with a hospital shortage, Bellevue hospital, maintained by the city for the poor, is congested with patients as never before, and a special meeting of the trustees has been called for Monday to discuss relief measures. The three hospitals on Blackwells Island to which Bellevue sends its overflow, are also filled to capacity, largely with tuberculosis patients, and the situation is acute. Bellevue was built to accommodate 1,650 patients. Tonight there are 1,230 there; Thursday night there were 1,330. Every inch of room in the wards has been utilized and dozens of cots and stretchers are scattered throughout the corridors. The increase in patients is attributed to no particular cause.

WANT SUBSIDY FOR A CANADIAN LINE

Australian Business Men Ask Government Of Commonwealth To Aid In Development Of Canadian Trade.

Melbourne, Australia, March 6.—A deputation from the Chamber of Commerce today waited on Frank G. Tudor, Minister of Trade and Customs, and discussed the possibility of developing Canadian-Australian trade. The deputation pointed out the importance of securing new markets and suggested that the government might subsidize a freight service in order to prevent local exporters from losing their hold on the Canadian market altogether. The minister promised to lay the request before the cabinet, but he said that he did not expect any action to be taken.
He mentioned that according to the figures of 1909 the Australian export trade to Canada represented only \$400,000, and that the value of this trade was no greater than he did not think the government would subsidize a direct line. He pointed out also that although the mail contract had lapsed, Canadian steamers still called at Sydney, so that the Commonwealth was no worse off in that respect.
