

FIRE DOES DAMAGE IN OLD QUEBEC

Two Big Factories And Many Dwellings Were Burned Saturday Afternoon—Loss Estimated At Quarter Million.

Quebec, May 27.—One of the worst fires which Quebec has had for many years past, took place this afternoon and resulted in the destruction of property to the amount of nearly a quarter of a million dollars.

At one time it looked as if the fire would assume the proportions of a great conflagration, but the good work of the firemen, handicapped as they were, prevented what might have been a terrible disaster.

The fire broke out in a roller skating rink on Notre Dame des Anges street, and quickly spread to adjoining buildings—among them the big carriage factory of Carrette and Co., on Dorchester street.

The fire in the carriage factory was a spectacular one, and the flames burst from all sections of the building. Across the street the flames jumped to the immense corset and box factory of G. E. Amyot and this was soon in the grasp of the flames.

The fire was at its height the R. C. G. A. under the command of Lieut. Ivan marched down from the city to assist the firemen, and they did splendid service.

The blaze was a very fierce one and the locality a dangerous one for a serious fire. A brisk wind was blowing at one time, and it looked as if the fire would assume even greater dimensions than it did.

Farnham, Que., May 27.—The first of the Liberal rallies to be held in this province during the recess of parliament, was held here today, about 400 people hearing speeches delivered by the Hon. Sydney Fisher, Hon. Rodolphe Lemieux and Messrs. Demers, Meigs and Allen, M. P.'s.

Mr. Fisher prefaced his remarks by referring to the talk of a general election in the near future and explained that it lay in the power of the Opposition to prevent a vote being taken on the reciprocity question.

While the right of speech in parliament," said Mr. Fisher, "is one dear to the Liberal mind, when abused outrageously, it must be gotten over. I will not accuse my political opponents of extreme abuse of this right."

Mr. Fisher believed that if the Opposition exercised its right of obstruction and forced the government to go to the country in advance of the distribution bill, which he thought would increase the membership of the House by about 30 members.
